PHILIPPINES BISHOPS SHOOT DOWN GUN PROPOSAL

The Catholic Bishops Conference has spoken out against the idea after Philippines national police chief Oscar Albayalde said he would help priests who wanted to arm themselves, as long they acquired permits and learned how to handle weapons.

On Monday, conference president Archbishop Romulo Valles said priests had a duty to turn the other cheek as "men of peace, not violence" and he "strongly" opposed their being armed.

That came after the Philippine Daily Inquirer quoted unnamed priests admitting they had bought guns or were considering doing so following the June 10 murder of priest Fr Richmond Nilo, 44.

What's in a name?

The name 'John' originates from the Hebrew language and means 'God has shown favour (grace)'. The name given to John the Baptist reflects both the favour God showed to Elizabeth and Zechariah in granting them a son and also the favour that God showed to the people through John. John's whole ministry was to call people back to God; to recognise that they were in God's favour and to respond accordingly through the way they lived their lives. In Luke's gospel, when Jesus announces the commencement of his ministry he announces the coming of the Lord's year of favour.

POPE CONDEMNS SEPARATION OF IMMIGRANT FAMILIES

"I am on the side of the bishops' conference," Pope Francis said in an interview with the Reuters news agency, published online yesterday. "Let it be clear that in these things, I respect (the position of) the bishops' conference."

Overnight, US President Donald Trump signed an executive order ending the process of separating children from families after they are detained crossing the US border illegally, News.com.au reports.

"We're going to have strong, very strong borders, but we're going to keep the families together," said Mr Trump who said he didn't like the "sight" or "feeling" of children separated from their parents.

He said his order would not end the "zero-tolerance" policy that criminally prosecutes all adults caught crossing the border illegally. The order aims to keep families together while they are in custody, expedite their cases, and ask the Department of Defence to help house families.

Last week, US Conference of Catholic Bishops president Cardinal Daniel DiNardo read a statement on behalf of the bishops denouncing the government's zero-tolerance policy.

"Families are the foundational element of our society, and they must be able to stay together. While protecting our borders is important, we can and must do better as a government, and as a society, to find other ways to ensure that safety. Separating babies from their mothers is not the answer and is immoral," the statement said.

The political rise of populist movements in both the US and in Europe has led to a severe crackdown on men, women and children trying to escape war, violence, poverty and persecution.

In Italy, Interior Minister Matteo Salvini banned the NGO rescue ship Aquarius, with more than 600 migrants aboard, to dock and has vowed to stop any foreign boats carrying rescued migrants into the country.

Pope Francis said the current wave of populist rhetoric against migrants was "creating psychosis" and that people seeking a better life should not be rejected.

Europe, he added, is facing a "great demographic winter" and, without immigration, the continent "will become empty."

"Some governments are working on it, and people have to be settled in the best possible

Fr Nilo was shot dead through his church window in front of parishioners as he prepared for Mass in Nueva Ecija province, north of Manila. He was the third priest since December to be killed in cold blood.

Several politicians are pushing for a Senate investigation into the killings, which some have blamed on a culture of violence and impunity since the 2016 election of President Rodrigo Duterte, a former prosecutor and mayor who came to power promising to fatten the fish of Manila Bay with the bodies of drug dealers and addicts.

In the almost two years since he took office, Mr Duterte has made good on that threat with the police recording 22,983 killings under investigation since the President launched his bloody war on drugs.

Mr Duterte has frequently attacked the Church for speaking out against the killings.

More recently he has begun targeting foreign church workers, including Australian Sr Patricia Fox who this week successfully challenged a deportation order for her work advocating for the poor and disenfranchised.

Manila auxiliary bishop Broderick Padillo told The Australian yesterday: "President Duterte has made many pronouncements against the Church and also pronouncements for killing drug addicts. He even defends the police and their so-called extrajudicial killings. There has been so many killings now.

"We don't know whether there was coordination in these (priest) killings, but for sure there is a culture of violence and impunity in this country."

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION:

Like the feast of the nativity of Jesus, this feast (The Nativity of John The Baptist) falls on one of the solstices, a hinge point in the cosmos. Some of the patristic writings tell us that the birth of Jesus was placed in the calendar when, in the northern hemisphere, the days began to lengthen. So this day was chosen to celebrate the birth of John precisely because the days were getting shorter. 'He must increase while I must decrease' (John 3:30). This is the time of seasonal change, of cosmic reversal. The entire universe has been alerted. Something new is about to happen.

John the Baptist is the hinge between the old age and the new eschatological age of fulfilment. John himself was never a disciple of Jesus; he did not enter the age that he heralded. He was the trumpet that sounded the coming of the king; he was the rooster that announced the dawning of the new day. He brought the people to the threshold of the new age, but he himself never stepped over into it. The idiosyncratic character of his life caught the attention of the crowds, but he did not keep this attention upon himself. Instead, he used it to point to Jesus, who appears to have been so commonplace that he might have been overlooked had not John cried out. It was John's prophetic destiny to be the sharp-edged sword, the polished arrow. He was the voice that cried in the wilderness: Hear me! Listen! Behold, he is coming!
