Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

At 5.00 pm Mass each Sunday those on the RCIA journey gather with sponsors and team members. Currently the Elect (those in our midst who are preparing for Baptism at Easter) are participating in very special rites celebrated over the middle three Sundays of Lent, known as the **Scrutinies**.

These are ancient rites and they may, at first, seem strange to us. But they are profoundly rooted in our human experience. We need to examine (scrutinize) how we are, the areas of our lives where we are tempted, or seriously sin - in what we do and what we fail to do. We all need healing and the strength that can come from the support of our sisters and brothers.

After the homily, the Elect are invited to come forward with their sponsors. Then, the whole assembly is invited to pray for them *in silence*. It is a very solemn moment. This community has cared for these elect and the candidates, for some months now on their journey. We have sent them to reflect more and more deeply on the Word of God, and expressed to them our longing for the day on which they would join us at the table of the Lord. Now we pray for them in this sacred silence, deeply asking God to protect them and heal them in the weeks ahead.

In a silent ritual deliberately reminiscent of the rite used for ordination in the Sacrament of Holy Orders, the priest laid his hands for a brief moment on the head of each of the Elect. It is a solemn act of calling down the Spirit of Jesus to be with them and protect them.

Our Elect and Candidates (those who have been baptised in another Christian Church) were handed the Apostles Creed during the first Scrutiny and for the first time they remained and stated their beliefs with the rest of the community.

The Elect were then sent forth to reflect upon the Word and this powerful gesture of love on the part of the community, that cares for them so deeply, with the love of Christ.

TRIDUUM CHOIR PRACTICE

As mentioned at our Masses last weekend, the date for the second practice for the Triduum Choir clashed with 2nd Rite of Reconciliation for the Cathedral community.

Therefore, we have changed the date (and time) to 7.15 on Tuesday 28th March with our final practice at 7.00 pm on Wednesday 5th April. This is a combined choir and there is an open invitation to members of the Cathedral Community to come and sing at Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Vigil ceremonies.

SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION IN PREPARATION FOR EASTER

On **Thursday 30th March**, the 2nd Rite of Reconciliation will be celebrated at the Cathedral at 7.00 pm. Several priests will be available during this Communal Liturgy of Prayer and Forgiveness in our parish.

Reconciliation (officially called the Sacrament of Penance, and also known as Confession) is a Sacrament instituted by Jesus Christ in his love and mercy to offer us forgiveness for the times we have sinned and turned away from God. At the same time, we are reconciled with the Church because it is also wounded by our sins.

Every time we sin, we hurt ourselves, other people and God. In Reconciliation, we acknowledge our sins before God and the Church. We express our sorrow in a meaningful way, receive the forgiveness of Christ and his Church, make reparation for what we have done, and resolve to do better in the future. (Diocese of Broken Bay)

Reflection on the Gospel-5th Sunday of Lent Year A

(John 11:1-45)

Sunday's readings touch into the most profound of mysteries, the mysteries of life and death. To hold a new born child or to see the sick restored to health is to experience the wonder of life. On the other hand, sudden death can bring unimagined grief and pain. The recent earthquake in Türkiye and Syria brought sudden death to tens of thousands of people and an extraordinary outpouring of grief. This unexpected tragedy has come at a time when thousands are dying every day in the world's major conflict zones and when extreme weather events continue to bring death and destruction and species loss. Death brings tears, even anger. Little wonder that "life" becomes a metaphor for transformation and new beginnings or that "death" so often signifies deprivation and loss.

The gospel reading is about the death and restoration to life of Lazarus, "the one whom Jesus loved". It is the last of the seven "signs" in John's "book of signs" that reveal the "glory" of God. It is also the greatest of Jesus' signs. It functions as a catalyst for the events that lead to his death: "...from that day on they planned to put him to death" (11:53). It provides the occasion for Jesus to assert "I am the resurrection and the life" and to invite assent to that revelation of his identity. It reveals the compassion and tender heart of Jesus who weeps at the grief of Mary his friend and at the death of her brother. It also reveals the goodness in the hearts of those "Jews" who share her grief and who come to faith in Jesus who raises the dead to life.

Though the story revolves around the plight of Lazarus, Martha and Mary are the characters who, with Jesus, occupy centre stage and into whose faith journey we are invited to enter. Martha and Mary are identified as "sisters" who live in Bethany. Are they blood "sisters" or sisters in their love of Jesus and the community around him, or both? Lazarus is Mary's sick "brother". Martha will later claim him as her "brother". Might they all be part of a little faith community in Bethany rather than biological siblings? A brief notice alerts the reader to the imminent death of Jesus: "Mary is the one who anointed Jesus with perfumed oil and wiped his feet with her tears". The reader will later discover that Mary's anointing of Jesus is "for the day of [his] burial".

As so often in John's gospel, misunderstanding and irony function to bring the actors in the drama, and to bring us as actors in the theatre of life, to new levels of understanding and faith. Right now, in the aftermath of earthquake and in the face of ongoing conflict, we are called, as sisters and brothers across the globe, to open our hearts and share our resources so that some measure of "life" might be restored.
