Sacramental Program Up-Date

The Bungaree Sacramental Program was set to start in early June, however due to the restrictions during this COVID-19 time, in consultation with Fr Sajan, the following decisions have been made:

• The Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist will be postponed till 2021. Children in Years 3 and 4 will be able to receive those sacraments then. Dates will be decided later in the year.

Mt 18:15-20

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

If your brother or sister listens to you, you will have won that person back.


Jesus said to his disciples: 'If your brother does something wrong, go and have it out with him alone, between your two selves. If he listens to you, you have won back your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others along with you: the evidence of two or three witnesses is required to sustain any charge. But if he refuses to listen to these, report it to the community; and if he refuses to listen to the community, treat him like a pagan or a tax collector.

'I tell you solemnly, whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.

'I tell you solemnly once again, if two of you on earth agree to ask anything at all, it will be granted to you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them.'

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WINNING PEOPLE BACK

The Church is not a community of the perfect. Allowance has to be made for dealing with moral lapses and dissensions that inevitably occur in a community still on the way to the Kingdom.

In today's Gospel the procedure Jesus lays down for dealing with conflict reveals his sense of the Church as the *family* of God. Correction should as far as possible be carried out in private. Only if that proves unsuccessful should a carefully staged progression of increasingly public procedures be set in place. The goal is not simply to win, but rather to 'win back' the 'brother or sister', to preserve as far as possible the dignity of the errant person, and to enhance everyone's sense of being a valued member of the 'family'.

If, despite all, the process fails, there is nothing to be done but to treat the person as an outsider. There comes a point beyond which a community can no longer tolerate members who consistently defy its core values.

To set someone outside the community is no light matter. The Church needs to know that its decisions in this regard enjoy heavenly sanction. Hence Jesus' assurance that the 'binding and loosing' authority conferred personally upon Peter in regard to interpretations of the law (Matthew 16:19), is also enjoyed by the local community with respect to the exclusion or non-exclusion of errant members. As risen Lord, Jesus remains 'Emmanuel', 'God with us', in community life and deliberation (see Matthew 1:23).

The Church's canon law and way of proceeding has developed way beyond this simple instruction. But its fundamental spirit should remain.

<u>Homily</u>

After the conclusion from chapter 16 read last Sunday, all of chapter 17 is omitted and we move ahead to the middle of chapter 18. This chapter constitutes the fourth of the five discourses or sermons that Matthew incorporates into his gospel. This one is his discourse on the Church or his Community Sermon.

It soon became evident in the life of the early Church that it was not a perfect society. Individuals sinned and communities splintered. A dispute resolution process needed to be developed. This is what Matthew offers in today's reading. A sinner is to be approached first by the individual, then by two or three others, then by the community. If all this fails, he is to be treated like a "pagan or a tax collector" – an ironic un-Christian use of these terms, given that Jesus' teaching and practice made such people insiders not outsiders!

Matthew adds two further statements. The first one extends to the community the power to bind and loose that had been given to Peter earlier in the gospel. The second combines two fundamental assertions. One, that when two or three agree on what to pray for, their prayer

will be answered; and two, that Jesus is present whenever "two or three meet in my name". This last declaration provides a warrant for the Second Vatican Council's teaching on Christ's presence in the worshipping assembly.

PRAYERS OF THE FAITHFUL

READER: Whenever two or three gather in Jesus' name, he is there as promised. Heartened by his presence, let us pray with hope and faith.

READER: We pray for Christian communities around the world, that they will be clear examples of integrity, conversion and reconciliation.

Lord, hear us.

READER: We pray for nations with advanced health services, that they will share them freely with those ill-equipped to deal with the coronavirus pandemic. Lord, hear us.

READER: We pray for fathers, step-fathers, grandfathers and all who have a fatherly role, that they will be blessed in loving those entrusted to their care.

Lord, hear us.

READER: We pray for children and adults unable to read, that International Literacy Day will prompt renewed investment in teachers and resources for them. Lord, hear us.

READER: God of everlasting kindness, in your Son Jesus Christ you have reconciled the world to yourself. Make us true apostles of your mercy. We ask this through Christ our Lord.
