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THE CALL TO CONVERSION

As Advent begins, we set out once again to prepare our hearts for the great feast of God's humble presence among us. Expectation and complacency, longing and listlessness, can all be found in our hearts as we prepare for Christmas. Today's readings speak of our need for God's presence and our thankful response of faithfulness.

The reading from Isaiah is a passionate plea for renewal and change. The people have been left to their own devices for too long. If God would only tear open the heavens and come down, the mountains would melt before God's presence. Isaiah hopes that the hearts of the people of Israel should also melt so that God the great potter, could once more mould, shape, and breathe life into their hearts.

Paul's perspective is one of thanksgiving for the gifts that have already been given as the community waits for the Lord's return. Such gifts are given to sustain us as we wait for the moment when Jesus will finally be revealed in glory.

It is one thing to be grateful for blessings and gifts received but the Gospel calls us to take the next step of using these gifts faithfully. The parable of the master who leaves his servants in charge during his absence is as relevant today as in the days of Mark. It is important to note that each of the servants is entrusted with a task to be faithfully completed. As Advent begins each one of us is given the task of preparing our hearts and lives to welcome the Lord.


Oh, that you would tear the heavens open and come down — at your Presence the mountains would melt.

<u>Homily</u>

All three synoptic gospels include an account of Jesus speaking in Jerusalem about the end times before he enters upon the passion that leads to his death. The language of Jesus' discourse is full of foreboding: he warns of upheavals in heaven and on earth, of destruction and desolation, persecution and betrayal. All of these are features of the apocalyptic literature that seems to have been common enough in Jesus' day. Now it is all but impossible for us to disentangle where he (or the evangelist) is talking about the destruction of Jerusalem, about a final cosmic conflict, or about the coming of the Son of Man.

Three times we are warned to "stay awake!". It's the same admonition that Jesus repeats to Peter, James and John in the garden of Gethsemane, when he is facing his own "end time". His whole mission and his very life are under threat and he has to summon every ounce of energy to go on. Jesus wants us to be under no illusions as to what is at stake when the cost of discipleship confronts us. We need to be alert and ready to choose life.

FR SAJAN: Let us now spend some time in prayer asking God to listen to our needs.

READER: We pray for Pope Francis, Bishop Paul, clergy and all Church and world leaders: that they will be guided by the Holy Spirit to help us to get ready during this Advent for Jesus to come to us. Lord, hear us.

READER: We pray for people in our world who are alone or suffering in any way especially during this Advent season that they may feel the love and care of others and know that they are deeply loved by God. Lord, hear us.

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November 23, 2020

Hello Everyone,

As you may have seen, the Victorian government has announced new provisions for religious gatherings, to take effect from tomorrow (November 23). This will make it much easier for us to gather for Mass and other celebrations. However, we should note that, while the number of people who can gather is much greater, COVIDSafe practices, including wearing masks, record keeping and cleaning, are still in place. The following is a summary of the new provisions.

Numbers permitted for religious gatherings and ceremonies

New limits from Monday, November 23

Indoor religious gatherings and ceremonies: Cap of **150** people with a density quotient of 1 person per 4 square metres.

Outdoor religious gatherings and ceremonies: Cap of **300** people with a density quotient of 1 person per 4 square metres.

At any one time, a venue can have either an indoor or outdoor ceremony, not both at the same time.

Weddings: Cap of 150 people with a density quotient of 1 person per 4 square metres indoors or outdoors. Persons necessary to conduct the wedding (such as celebrant and servers) are not counted in this limit.

Funerals, including wakes: Cap of **150** mourners with a density quotient of 1 person per 4 square metres indoors or outdoors. Persons necessary to conduct the funeral (such as a faith leader) are not counted in this limit.

To calculate the number of people who can gather in a particular area, you will need to measure the floor space and divide by 4. For example, if a church is 30 metres long x 10 metres wide, the area is 300 square metres. So you could have 75 people gather in that church for Mass.

Note: Cleaning, signage, record keeping, and other COVIDSafe requirements continue to apply. In general, those attending must wear masks. Masks may be removed when necessary, for example, while leading prayers or reading the Scriptures or receiving Communion.
