Mass of the Oils: Monday March 29, 2021

The Mass of the Oils (or Chrism Mass) was celebrated in St Patrick's Cathedral, Ballarat last Monday, March 29. Despite COVID restrictions on numbers, the mass was well attended with representatives from all the forty parishes of the Diocese present. Bishop Bird celebrated the mass. Judith Hodgon accepted the oils (oil of the Sick, oil of Catechumens, oil for the Holy Chrism) on behalf of the Parish of Gordon and Liz Hanrahan on behalf of the Parish of Bungaree. For those that were unable to attend, the Mass will be available to view from the diocesan website shortly.

Blessing of the Pascal Candles

Fr Sajan will bless the Pascal Candles at the Vigil Mass to be held at Gordon on Saturday 3 April, 7 pm.

The Paschal Candle or Easter Candle is a new candle which is blessed and lit every year in the Church at Easter Vigil. The candle represents Christ, the light of the World. The pure beeswax of which the candle is made represents the sinless Christ who was formed in the womb of His Mother. The wick signifies His humanity, the flame, His Divine Nature, both soul and body. Five grains of incense inserted into the candle in the form of a cross recall the aromatic spices with which His Sacred Body was prepared for the tomb, and of the five wounds in His hands, feet, and side. The Easter candle is lighted each day for daily Mass during the Easter Octave and also on all Sunday Masses and all Solemnities during the fifty days of Easter. It is also lighted on special occasions such as Baptisms and Funerals.

Lenten Resources - Easter Triduum

The Sandhurst Diocese kindly shares their reflections on excerpts from Pope Francis' "Let us Dream", together with insights and suggestions for action from one of the Australian Plenary Council Thematic Discernment papers. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, vet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses – we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead - and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

SECOND READING Col 3: 1-4 A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Colossians

Look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is.

Since you have been brought back to true life with Christ, you must look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed and he is your life – you too will be revealed in all your glory with him.

In 20: 1-9 GOSPEL A reading from the holy

Gospel according to John. The teaching of scripture is that

he must rise from the dead.

It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved. 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb' she said 'and we don't know where they have put him.'

So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first; he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground, but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over his head; this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went in; he saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead.

MASS OF EASTER NIGHT

EPISTLE Rom 6: 3-11 A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans.


Christ, having been raised from the dead, will never die again.

When we were baptised in Christ Jesus we were baptised in his death; in other words, when we were baptised we went into the tomb with him and joined him in death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the Father's glory, we too might live a new life.

If in union with Christ we have imitated his death, we shall also imitate him in his resurrection. We must realise that our former selves have been crucified with him to destroy this sinful body and to free us from the slavery of sin. When a man dies, of course, he has finished with sin.

But we believe that having died with Christ we shall return to life with him: Christ, as we know, having been raised from the dead will never die again. Death has no power over him any more. When he died, he died, once for all, to sin, so his life now is life with God; and in that way, you too must consider yourselves to be dead to sin but alive for God in Christ Jesus.

early in the morning on the first day of the week they went to the tomb, just as the sun was rising.

They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?' But when they looked they could see that the stone – which was very big - had already been rolled back. On entering the tomb they saw a young man in a white robe seated on the right-hand side, and they were struck with amazement. But he said to them, 'There is no need for alarm. You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified: he has risen, he is not here. See, here is the place where they laid him. But you must go and tell his disciples and Peter, "He is going before you to Galilee; it is there you will see him, just as he told you."'


MASS DURING THE DAY FIRST READING

What words or phrases stand out for you?


It is the very heart of God that overflows in those famous passages of the father rushing out to hug his prodigal son; the wedding host who gathers guests from the roads and the fields for his banquet; the net-breaking catch of fish at dawn after a night of fruitless trawling; or Jesus washing the feet of his disciples on the night before he died. Such overflows of love happen, above all, at the crossroads of life, at moments of openness, fragility, and humility, when the ocean of his love bursts the dams of our self-sufficiency, and so allows for a new imagination of the possible.

Pope Francis, Let us Dream, 81

Lasting peace is about creating and maintaining processes of mutual listening ... Sometimes walking together means continuing to endure disagreements, leaving them to be transcended on a higher level at a later time. Time is superior to space, and the whole is greater than the parts ... the Lord always keeps His promises.

Pope Francis, Let us Dream, 83, 92

Truth lies outside us like a 'kindly light': Like John Henry Newman, whom I declared a saint in October 2019, I see the truth lying outside us, always beyond us, but beckoning to us through our consciences. It is like a "kindly light" we reach not normally through reason, but "through the imagination, by means of direct impressions, by the testimony of facts and events, by history ... Newman was convinced, as am I, that in embracing what often appear at first sight to be contradictory truths and trusting in the kindly light to lead us, we will eventually come to see the greater truth that lies beyond us. I like to think that we do not possess the truth so much as the truth possesses us, constantly attracting us by means of beauty and goodness.
