# 18th April 2021 ~ Third Sunday of Easter (B)

# Focus on the Scriptures

The Gospel, Luke 24:35-48, takes us to the penultimate scene of Luke's account of Jesus' risen life (just prior to his departure from the earth at Bethany). It is Easter Sunday evening. The two disciples who have encountered the risen Lord on their journey to Emmaus have returned and shared their marvellous story. Now the disciples who have remained in Jerusalem are to meet the risen Lord them-


In the way typical of the resurrection appearances across all four Gospels, the risen Lord meets the disciples exactly where they are emotionally: fearful, agitated, slow to believe, thinking that what they are seeing is a ghost. Jesus takes considerable pains to overcome their disbelief by making clear the full physical reality of his presence. He urges them to see and touch him, and eats a piece of fish before their eyes (vv. 38-42). Luke dramatizes here – perhaps in an overly realistic way - what Paul also insists upon, writing to the Corinthians (1 Cor 15:35-49): you cannot believe in the resurrection without believing that it involved – both for Jesus and for believers after him – full bodily existence.

But simply recognising the risen Lord is not enough. As the scene moves to a second stage (vv. 43-49), Jesus repeats for those present the scriptural catechesis concerning the Messiah given to the two disciples on the road (24:25 -27). Full faith in the resurrection comes about when people grasp that all that has happened to him – his suffering, his death and now his resurrection – fulfils all that had been written about the Messiah (literally 'about me') in the Scriptures

All this involved a very considerable transformation of conventional expectation about the Messiah – especially, as stated in the final sentence, that the Messiah would suffer and that his central role would not be the restoration of the fortunes

of Israel but the reconciliation of the entire world with God. The disciples have now been made 'witnesses' of all this. Soon, empowered with the Spirit, they will be sent out to spread this joyful message to the nations.

As we already learned in the First Reading, coming to see 'how it all fits together' - not only in respect to Jesus but also in our own lives - is so much part of arriving at that 'knowledge of salvation' (Luke 1:77) which the Scriptures, especially the Gospel of Luke, aim to convey.

Good Shepherd Sunday: Word Day of Vocations - April 25 (Fourth **Sunday of Easter)** Next Sunday is the World Day of Vocations: Pope Francis tells us: "There can be no greater joy than to risk one's life for the Lord! I would like to say this especially to you, the young. Do not be deaf to the Lord's call. If he calls you to follow this path, do not pull your oars into the boat, but trust him. Let us pray for the young people in our community, and in our families and circle of friends. May our prayers help them to be open to the Lord's call to consecrated life or priesthood."

Pope Francis – Message for 2021 World Day of Vocations. Saint Joseph: "The Dream of Vocation 'God looks on the heart (cf. 1 Sam 16:7), and in Saint Joseph he recognized the heart of a father, able to give and generate life in the midst of daily routines. Vocations have this same goal: To beget and renew lives every day. The Lord desires to shape the hearts of fathers and mothers: Hearts that are open, capable of great initiatives, generous in self-giving, compassionate in comforting anxieties and steadfast in strengthening hopes. The priesthood and the consecrated life greatly need these qualities nowadays, in times marked by fragility but also by the sufferings due to the pandemic, which has spawned uncertainties and fears about the future and the very meaning of life. Saint Joseph comes to meet us in his gentle way, as one of 'the saints next door.' At the same time, his strong witness can guide us on the journey.'"

A prayer request We remember to pray for all our young people in our Diocese and their future. They are the present, future and hope of the Church. God has a plan and hope for all of them to live out their vocational call whatever that may be - marriage, the single life and also amongst them are some who would make a good priest or religious. Holy Hours with prayer before the Blessed Sacrament are good opportunities for the parish to gather in silence to listen, discern and pray for the future of our young people. Let us support them and those entrusted to their formation especially parents, educators and role models, with our prayers.
