Focus on the Scriptures

As incredible as it may seem, some people turn down the invitation to the eschatological banquet. This is the case, both in the parable and in our world today. This invitation seems much less interesting than a sports event, the latest movie, or some social affair. So much of our time and energy is spent either climbing the economic ladder or just trying to keep our heads above water. Even if we are interested in the banquet, we do not seem able to afford the time and energy that it might require. And so we send our regrets: I cannot come. What a shame! We seem to have forgotten that everything is tending toward the end; all of our plans, interests and distractions will cease. Only the banquet will remain. All God asks of us is that we receive the blessings that have been prepared for us. We need not work for them. In fact, we cannot work for them on our own. All we can do is enjoy them. Enjoyment of the eschatological time of fulfilment is open to all, but auaranteed to none.

One theme seems to connect all of the readings for this Sunday, our total dependence on God. God spreads the banquet table and invites the guests; God punishes those who are indifferent to or antagonistic toward the eschatological banquet; God supplies whatever we need in whatever circumstances we find ourselves. We do not have to bargain with God, or make reservations. All we have to do is accept what God has to offer.

We pray: Those in need of our prayers; all the sick and all those struggling with the effects of Covid-19.

Churches, worship, sacraments and the easing of restrictions Bishop Paul has communicated to the people of the Ballarat Diocese informing us that together with the other bishops of Victoria, he has been making representations to government for an easing of the restrictions in relation to places of worship. He has proposed that places of worship should at least be treated in the same way as other places where people can gather socially. In the coming week, bishops and other religious leaders will have further meetings with government. It is hoped these meetings will bear fruit so that we will be able to gather again in our churches. We do need to safeguard the community's health, yet we have shown that we can observe the necessary precautions for physical health at the same time as we celebrate the liturgy, which contributes so much to the spiritual and mental health of the community. Bishop Paul prays particularly that we will soon be able to share the Eucharist, source and summit of the Christian life, but at this time it is not possible for us to gather for Mass.

It is still possible for parishes to live-stream Mass, however this can only involve up to five people. The provisions do not allow us to gather in our churches to celebrate Mass as we would dearly wish to. <u>Funerals</u> will be able to have up to 20 people gathered, plus those required to conduct the funeral. <u>Weddings</u> will be able to have up to 10 people gathered (including the couple and two witnesses), plus the celebrant.

<u>Baptisms</u> cannot be celebrated until there is a further easing of restrictions. For those seeking to celebrate the sacrament of **<u>Reconciliation</u>**, this can be done by contacting the priest directly to make an appointment.

Anointing of the Sick remains possible in Hospitals and Aged Care facilities. Priests are permitted to visit these institutions when a person's condition has been designated 'end of life.' The priests will continue to be available to offer pastoral and sacramental care for the sick and the dying in their own homes.

In the coming week we will consider how our churches may be opened for private worship in ways that operate within the government guidelines. The seriousness of the potential health risks and the penalties for breaching the law demand a very considered approach and a workable system. In the meantime the mission of Christ that we have been given to serve, reach out, care for each other and pray continues.

Parish Appointments - *Mildura, Merbein and Redcliffs* the Bishop has appointed Fr Shaiju Mathew to be assistant priest from the First Sunday of Advent. Fr Shaiju has been assistant priest at the Cathedral since his arrival in the Diocese 6 months ago. *Horsham, Nhill, Warracknabeal and Hopetoun*—Fr Peter Hudson will be retiring on 27 December. From January 21st, Mons Glynn Murphy current administrator of Warracknabeal and Hopetoun will become Parish Priest of Horsham and Nhill and also of Warracknabeal and Hopetoun. Fr Jim McKay currently at East Wimmera will become the assistant priest.



Gospel Mt 22:1-14 A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to the chief priests and elders of the people: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a feast for his son's wedding. He sent his servants to call those who had been invited, but they would not come. Next he sent some more servants. "Tell those who have been invited" he said "that I have my banquet all prepared, my oxen and fattened cattle have been slaughtered, everything is ready. Come to the wedding." But they were not interested: one went off to his farm, another to his business, and the rest seized his servants, maltreated them and killed them. The king was furious. He dispatched his troops, destroyed those murderers and burnt their town. Then he said to his servants, "The wedding is ready; but as those who were invited proved to be unworthy, go to the crossroads in the town and invite everyone you can find to the wedding." So these servants went out onto the roads and collected together everyone they could find, bad and good alike; and the wedding hall was filled with guests.
