Fr. Andrew Hayes The Early Church

The first reading this Sunday speaks of a time when the Church might have felt a bit like ours. The early Christians went through stages when gathering for Eucharist was life-threatening. I'm thinking of lions or what-haveyou rather than a pandemic, but either way life was fraught and gathering together was difficult. How did the early Christians respond? The reading says that they "met in the temple every day, but met in their houses for the breaking of bread;" What is that about? Many people were Jews who had now become Christian, so they prayed the Jewish prayers on Saturday in the temple and then the Christian prayers on Sunday, in their homes because they didn't yet have churches. I hope people are finding the resources useful for your prayers at home. Are you reading the scripture together from the bulletin, or downloading prayers or using what you've got? I was in the highlands of New Guinea one Sunday many years ago and we had neither bible nor prayer book, so on Sunday we sat in a circle and told our favourite bible stories. It's been nice to hear from people who have found Masses online or watched on television. I laughed at this one, "I choose my online Mass by which one is the shortest!" Fair enough.

The Acts of the Apostles also says, "The whole community remained faithful to the teaching of the apostles ... and to the prayers ... they shared their food gladly and generously; they praised God and were looked up to by everyone ..." Yes, let us share our food and toilet rolls gladly and generously and look after one another. I'm trying to shop weekly rather than every day, only giving the plague one weekly shot at catching up with me. Never needed to be so organised. "Looked up to by everyone..." Did you watch the Cardinal Pell interview? We're not looked up to by a lot of people. Cardinal Pell spoke about that. We have a long way to go. There remains a lot of apologising to do. A lot of healing is yet to happen.

I was advised, for security reasons, to remove the Blessed Sacrament from the presbytery window in Stawell. I'm sorry that this seemed necessary. The taking away seemed a bit like Good Friday.

April 19th 2020 Pentecost

Maybe the answer is in the Gospel. "Receive the Holy Spirit..." When the early Church couldn't see Jesus they had Pentecost to enliven them. I don't suppose it will happen, but wouldn't it be GREAT if the lockdown ended in time for Mass on Pentecost Sunday, May 31? Tongues of fire, all of that. We would emerge from the cold isolation, emerge from the churches newly fired in the Spirit. Wouldn't it be a great sign of God's presence in the Church in the world! Don't suppose it will happen. Whatever Sunday we're allowed back in, this year or next, maybe we could start with Pentecost Mass. Pentecost is the birthday of the Church, the reenlivening of the spirit-filled people of God. In the meantime, wash your hands and share your toilet rolls!

Half a Priest Each

Now that we have half a priest in each parish we'll need to have lots of parishioners doing a little bit. We'll need a parish council in Stawell, and funeral helpers in both parishes. We'll need liturgy people to organise things. Who will order the bread and wine and change the colours of the seasons? Lots and lots of jobs that half a priest each won't be able to do. Pleased wonder about what you can do. Stay tuned for a list of jobs, for both Stawell and Ararat. The plague has given us a good chance to be up and ready when we're allowed. Let's be ready. First Reading Acts 2:42-47

The faithful lived together and owned everything in common. The whole community remained faithful to the teaching of the apostles, to the brotherhood, to the breaking of bread and to the prayers. The many miracles and signs worked through the apostles made a deep impression on everyone.

The faithful all lived together and owned everything in common; they sold their goods and possessions and shared out the proceeds among themselves according to what each one needed.

They went as a body to the Temple every day but met in their houses for the breaking of bread; they shared their food gladly and generously; they praised God and were looked up to by everyone. Day by day the Lord added to their community those destined to be saved.

(R.) Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, his love is everlasting.

Second Reading 1 Pt 1:3-9

He has given us a new birth as his children, by raising Jesus Christ from the dead.

Blessed be God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who in his great mercy has given us a new birth as his sons, by raising Jesus Christ from the dead, so that we have a sure hope and the promise of an inheritance that can never be spoilt or soiled and never fade away, because it is being kept for you in the heavens. Through your faith, God's power will guard you until the salvation which has been prepared is revealed at the end of time. This is a cause of great joy for you, even though you may for a short time have to bear being plagued by all sorts of trials; so that, when Jesus Christ is revealed, your faith will have been tested and proved like gold – only it is more precious than gold, which is corruptible even though it bears testing by fire - and then you will have praise and glory and honour. You did not see him, yet you love him; and still without seeing him, you are already filled with a joy so glorious that it cannot be described, because you believe; and you are sure of the end to which your faith looks forward, that is, the salvation of your souls.

Gospel Acclamation Jn 20:29

Alleluia, alleluia!

You believe in me, Thomas, because you have seen me; happy those who have not seen me, but still believe! Alleluia!

Gospel Jn 20:19-31

After eight days Jesus came in and stood among them.

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord. and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you. 'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.' After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.' Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them, 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him: 'You believe because you can see me.

Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

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SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY by Dianne Bergant CSA The themes for the second Sunday of Easter set the tone for the entire Easter season. They are all directed toward mystagogical instruction, primarily of the neophytes who were baptised during the Easter Vigil, but also of the whole Christian community. The readings for this season provide us an extended meditation on the resurrection and on our own incorporation into it through the mysteries of initiation.

Most of us are like Thomas who looked for some tangible evidence of the resurrection. We do not find it any easier to live by faith than he did. However, when we do live by faith, we actually discover tangible proof. This proof can be seen in the way the community reaches out in care and support to others. Jesus extends his wounded hands to us as he did to Thomas, and the community is invited to touch his wounds as we touch the wounds of our world. We find a similar situation in the reading from Acts where the fledgling Christian community grew in number as a result of the teaching of the apostles. So it has always been. Those who are not eye witnesses of the actual events are called, through the teaching of others, to witness to the power of the resurrection.

Although the blessings that we derive from the resurrection are clearly gifts from God, they are nonetheless costly gifts. They have been won through the blood of Christ, and we too may have to pay dearly for having received them.
