We have all withered like leaves and our sins blew us away like the wind. No one invoked your name or roused himself to catch hold of you. For you hid your face from us and gave us up to the power of our sins. And yet, Lord, you are our Father; we the clay, you the potter, we are all the work of your hand.

Stay awake! You never know when the Lord will come.

It is like a man travelling abroad: he has gone from home, and left his servants in charge, each with his own task; and he has told the doorkeeper to stay awake. So stay awake, because you do not know when the master of the house is coming, evening, midnight, cockcrow, dawn; if he comes unexpectedly, he must not find you asleep. And what I say to you I say to all: Stay awake!'

Reflection by Dr Scott Hahn

The new Church year begins with a plea for God's visitation. "Oh that you would rend the heavens and come down," the prophet Isaiah cries in today's First Reading.

In today's Psalm, we also hear the anguished voice of Israel, imploring God to look down from His heavenly throne, to save and shepherd His people.

Today's readings are relatively brief. Their language and "message" are deceptively simple. But we should take note of the serious mood and penitential aspect of the Liturgy today as the people of Israel recognize their sinfulness, their failures to keep God's covenant, their inability to save themselves.

This Advent season, as we examine our consciences, we should see our own lives in the experience of Israel - that we often harden our hearts, refuse His rule, wander from His ways, withhold our love from Him. God is faithful, He is our Father. He has heard to the cry of His children, coming down from heaven for Israel's sake and for ours to redeem us from our exile from God, to restore us to His love.

In Jesus, we have seen the Father, who has let His face shine upon us. No matter how far we have strayed, He will give us new life if we turn to Him, if we call upon His holy name, and pledge anew never again to withdraw from Him.

As Paul tells us, He has given us every spiritual gift, especially the Eucharist and penance, to strengthen us as we await Christ's final coming. He will keep us firm to the end, if we let Him. So, in this season of repentance, we should heed the warning repeated three times by our Lord in today's Gospel: be watchful, for we know not the hour when the Lord of the house will return.

Feast Days this Week: 6th St Nicholas was the bishop of Myra in 4th century Asia Minor, during the time of the Roman Empire. He was known for his great piety, love of the poor especially children, charity and zeal. He was also known as a wonderworker because of the many miracles attributed to him. He suffered and survived torture and imprisonment for his faith and was later present at the Council of Nicaea.

7th St Ambrose was a theologian and statesman who served as Bishop of Milan from 374 to 397. He fiercely promoted Christianity against Arianism and paganism. He was known for his scholarship, service to the poor, oratory skills, leadership of the people, and defense of the Church. He was also the reason for St Augustine's conversion.

8th Immaculate Conception was formally defined by Pope Pius IX in 1854 but was universally believed throughout the centuries prior to this. The doctrine confirms that Our Lady was conceived without *Original Sin*, that twist in our nature that makes our will tend not to follow what it knows to be right. It was this grace that enabled Mary to give a true and considered "Yes" to the request to be the Mother of God.

9th St Juan Diego was born about 1474 in the kingdom of Texcoco, part of present day Mexico. As an adult he and his wife embraced Christianity and were Baptised. In 1531 Our Lady appeared to him on the hill called Tepeyac near Mexico City and told him to ask the Bishop to have a church built on the spot. After a miracle with the imprinting of an image of Our Lady on Juan Diego's cloak the church was built in honour of Our Lady of Guadalupe. He was known for the purity of his faith and humility. *Prayer For Australia*: Eternal Father, I offer you the Precious Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ offered at all the Masses throughout the world, in atonement, and to protect Australia from the sin of abortion, euthanasia, and from every evil. Through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Prayer for Freedom of Religious Belief Heavenly Father, we pray for our politicians to work openly with our faith communities, and for faith leaders, teachers, parents and guardians of children, to protect religious freedom from within our churches. We pray for the appropriate formation of children in accordance with the traditional teachings of their families. We ask this through the intercession of Our Lady Help of Christians and St Mary of the Cross. Amen
