Entrance Antiphon

Drop down dew from above, you heavens, and let the clouds rain down the Just One; let the earth be opened and bring forth a Saviour.

First Reading Is 7:10-14

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

The virgin will conceive.

The Lord spoke to Ahaz and said, 'Ask the Lord your God for a sign for yourself coming either from the depths of Sheol or from the heights above.' 'No', Ahaz answered 'I will not put the Lord to the test.'

Then Isaiah said:

'Listen now, House of David:
are you not satisfied with trying the patience of
men
without trying the patience of my God, too?
The Lord himself, therefore,
will give you a sign.
It is this: the maiden is with child
and will soon give birth to a son
whom she will call Immanuel,
a name which means "God-is-with-us".'

Second Reading Rom 1:1-7

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Jesus Christ, a descendant of David, is the Son of God.

From Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus who has been called to be an apostle, and specially chosen to preach the Good News that God promised long ago through his prophets in the scriptures.

This news is about the Son of God, who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead. Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

Gospel Acclamation Mt 1:23

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son;

his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us. Alleluia!

Gospel Mt 1:18-24

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus was born of Mary, the betrothed of Joseph, a son of David.

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together, she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally. He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel,

a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

Communion Antiphon

Behold, a Virgin shall conceive and bear a son; and his name will be called Emmanuel.

Reflection by Dr John Bergsma

As Christians, we tend to assume that the idea of God coming into one's life is always an attractive concept. However, that's a bit naïve. In this Sunday's readings, we encounter situations in which people found the invasion of God into their lives to be a little bit distressing. The readings remind us that Jesus is not a passive presence within us.

The name Jesus comes from the Hebrew y'shua, meaning "salvation." So, we can translate the angel's words as, "You are to name him Salvation, because he will save his people from



their sins." To "save from sin" is not the same as "save from the consequences of sin." Jesus did not come merely to save us from hell but to save us from sinning.

Like the Old Testament Joseph, son of Jacob, who was a great dreamer and interpreter of dreams, so God communicates with this New Testament Joseph, son of Jacob through dreams.

Note that the angel calls Joseph, 'Son of David'. Joseph was, in fact of the line of David, and here the angel is emphasising his connection to the promises and covenant attached to the House of David, including Isaiah's promise of an "Emmanuel" to be born of a "maiden" of this dynasty.

The presence of God in Joseph and Mary's lives means an end to business as usual and the typical comfort of ordinary life. Their lives are not going to be normal and typical. The angel guides Joseph to his next step—completing his marriage to Mary. We know that the coming months will involve more strain and stress—a long journey to Bethlehem in the late stages of pregnancy followed by a midnight flight from Bethlehem to Egypt to escape from persecution.

At Mass, we prepare to receive the "divine invasion" of the Eucharist, when God again will enter into our lives and our bodies, "Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity." Are we ready for that? Are we ready to let our lives go off course, off into a new direction, perhaps even an uncomfortable direction because God is now living in us?

<u>Updating Rosters:</u> An existing list of people involved in Reading, Prayers of the Faithful, Offertory Procession etc will be on the table near the kitchen <u>until the end of the year</u>. If, however you would like to take your name from a list then just put a line through it. In this way we can start fresh for the new year.

<u>Did you know?</u> The name 'Jesus' comes from the Hebrew *y'shua*, meaning "salvation." It's usually given as "Joshua," but the Gospels were written in Greek, and Greek has no "sh" sound. Further, men's names in Greek generally end in "s," so the transliteration ends up as Iesus, pronounced yaysoos. So, we can translate the angel's words as, "You are to name him Salvation, because he will save his people from their sins."

<u>Nazareth</u> was a small community settled by Davidides (descendants of the royal house) in the time after they had returned from their Babylonian exile. The name "Nazareth" means "little branch or shoot" after the promises of the Nezer or "branch" of David who was to come as Isaiah foretold 11:1.5 "A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; and a Branch shall grow out of his roots. And the Spirit of the Lord shall rest on him..."

Who or what is the *nezer*? The Nezer was a crown or branch/line of the royal family associated with royal priesthood. It symbolized dedication to the Temple and separation from worldly things. In the Torah, when high priests were anointed, they were crowned, but this kind of crown wasn't just for priests. Saul's crown, which was returned to David after his death, was identified as a *nezer*. The significance of this is that Jesus was and is both High Priest and King.

<u>Bethlehem</u> means "house of bread" because of the fertile fields that surround the town. Here it was, and not by accident but Divine plan, that Jesus the "Bread of Life" was born and placed in a manger - a food trough for the animals.

The prophet Isaiah who wrote 700 years before Jesus was born! The prophet Zechariah wrote, 520 years before Jesus was born. In his visions and writings *Joshua*, was a keyperson of the time, he was son of Jehozadak, and was the *High Priest* of the newly <u>rebuilt Temple</u>. But the angel of God made something very clear to Zechariah, and that was that *Joshua* was a symbol of something yet to come... something, or someone, known as *God's Servant*, the Branch.
