It is for the sake of my servant Jacob, of Israel my chosen one, that I have called you by your name, conferring a title though you do not know me.

I am the Lord, unrivalled; there is no other God besides me. Though you do not know me, I arm you that men may know from the rising to the setting of the sun that, apart from me, all is nothing.

Gospel Matthew 22:15-21

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Give to Caesar the things that belong to Caesar and to God the things that are God's.

The Pharisees went away to work out between them how to trap Jesus in what he said. And they sent their disciples to him, together with the Herodians, to say, 'Master, we know that you are an honest man and teach the way of God in an honest way, and that you are not afraid of anyone, because a man's rank means nothing to you. Tell us your opinion, then. Is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?' But Jesus was aware of their malice and replied, 'You hypocrites! Why do you set this trap for me? Let me see the money you pay the tax with.' They handed him a denarius, and he said, 'Whose head is this? Whose name?' 'Caesar's' they replied. He then said to them, 'Very well, give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar- and to God what belongs to God.'

Communion Antiphon

Behold, the eyes of the Lord are on those who fear him, who hope in his merciful love, to rescue their souls from death, to keep them alive in famine.

Reflection by Dr Scott Hahn

The Lord is king over all the earth, as we sing in today's Psalm. Governments rise and fall by His permission, with no authority but that given from above. In effect, God says to every ruler what He tells King Cyrus in today's First Reading: "I have called you . . . though you knew me not."

The Lord raised up Cyrus to restore the Israelites from exile, and to rebuild Jerusalem. Throughout salvation history, God has used foreign rulers for the sake of His chosen people. Pharaoh's heart was hardened to reveal God's power. Invading armies were used to punish Israel's sins. The Roman occupation during Jesus' time was, in a similar way, a judgment on Israel's unfaithfulness. Jesus' famous words in today's Gospel, "repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar," are a pointed reminder of this. And they call us, too, to keep our allegiances straight.

The Lord alone is our king. His kingdom is not of this world, but it begins here in His Church, which tells of His glory among all peoples. Citizens of heaven, we are called to be a light to the world, working in faith, labouring in love, and enduring in hope, as today's Epistle counsels.

We owe the government a concern for the common good and obedience to laws—unless they conflict with God's commandments as interpreted by the Church. But we owe God everything. The coin bears Caesar's image. But we bear God's own image. We owe Him our very lives, all our heart, mind, soul, and strength, offered as a living sacrifice of love.

We should pray for our leaders, that like Cyrus they do God's will, until from the rising of the sun to its setting all humanity knows that Jesus is Lord.

<u>Pope's Prayer Intention for October:</u> For the Synod—We pray for the Church, that she may adopt listening and dialogue as a way of lifestyle and be guided by the Holy Spirit towards the peripheries of the world.

Feast Days this Week: 23rd St John of Capistrano (1386-1456) was born in the Abruzzi region of Italy, studied law and was a judge before joining the Franciscan friars Minor where he was ordained. He travelled throughout Germany, Poland and eastern Europe strengthening morals and combating heresy. When the Turks were invading Europe they laid siege to Belgrade. John preached a crusade against them and also took part in the battle, lifting the siege and defeating the invasion of Europe for the next 70 years. He died of a plague that swept through the camp shortly afterwards.

24th St Anthony Mary Claret (1807-1870) was born in Sallent in Catalonia, Spain. After becoming a priest he preached throughout the region and then in the Canary Islands. Returning to Spain he established a missionary order and a religious library where he published millions of cheap copies of new and old Catholic books. He was appointed as Bishop of Cuba in 1851, where everything, including the church, was in a terrible state needing renewal and reform. He built many schools and a hospital and suffered 15 assassination attempts. Re was recalled to Spain to act as confessor to queen Isabella II and died 6yrs later because of failing health.

28th Sts Simon & Jude – St Simon is the 11th of the Apostles and is known as Simon the Zealot to denote his love for the faith. He died either by being sawn in half or by crucifixion. St Jude was a cousin to Jesus and is also called Thaddeus. He travelled east with St Simon and was also martyred. He is known as the patron saint of lost and desperate causes.
