The Son of Man came to give his life as a ransom for all.

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, approached Jesus. 'Master,' they said to him, 'we want you to do us a favour.' He said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' They said to him, 'Allow us to sit one at your right hand and the other at your left in your glory.' 'You do not know what you are asking' Jesus said to them. 'Can you drink the cup that I must drink, or be baptised with the baptism with which I must be baptised?' They replied, 'We can.' Jesus

said to them, 'The cup that I must drink you shall drink, and with the baptism with which I must be baptised you shall be baptised, but as for seats at my right hand or my left, these are not mine to grant; they belong to those to whom they have been allotted.'

When the other ten heard this they began to feel indignant with James and John, so Jesus called them to him and said to them: 'You know that among the pagans their so-called rulers lord it over them, and their great men make their authority felt. This is not to happen among you. No; anyone who wants to become great among you must be your servant, and anyone who wants to be first among you must be slave to all. For the Son of Man himself did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.'

REFLECTION by Scott Hahn

The sons of Zebedee hardly know what they're asking in today's Gospel. They are thinking in terms of how the Gentiles rule, of royal privileges and honours.

But the road to Christ's kingdom is by way of His Cross. To share in His glory, we must be willing to drink the cup that He drinks.

The cup is an Old Testament image for God's judgment. The wicked would be made to drink this cup in punishment for their sins. But Jesus has come to drink this cup on behalf of all humanity. He has come to be baptized—which means plunged or immersed—into the sufferings we all deserve for our sins.

In this He will fulfill the task of Isaiah's suffering servant, whom we read about in today's First Reading. Like Isaiah's servant, the Son of Man will give His life as an offering for sin, as once Israel's priests offered sacrifices for the sins of the people.

Jesus is the heavenly high priest of all humanity, as we hear in today's Epistle. Israel's high priests offered the blood of goats and calves in the temple sanctuary. But Jesus entered the heavenly sanctuary with His own blood.

And by bearing our guilt and offering His life to do the will of God, Jesus ransomed "the many" paying the price to redeem humanity from spiritual slavery to sin and death.

He has delivered us from death, as we rejoice in today's Psalm.

We need to hold fast to our confession of faith, as today's Epistle exhorts us. We must look upon our trials and sufferings as our portion of the cup He promised to those who believe in Him. We must remember that we have been baptized into His passion and death.

In confidence, let us approach the altar today, the throne of grace, at which we drink the cup of His saving blood.

As I write this, I have no idea whether we will still be in "lockdown" on the weekend or not and whether Mass will be possible for Group 2. I do know that both Peter and I have been at an exposure site so there is no possibility of me printing or delivering this bulletin – possibly/probably for the next 14 days. Hopefully the lockdown will lift and only those affected by the exposure site will have to isolate the but who knows. So those that receive this via email will receive it regardless and I will try to find some way of keeping our news generated. In the meantime, let us look for the beauty around us, stay closer to Jesus through our prayer, keep in contact with each other via phone or any other safe way and stay positive.

Report from the Plenary: Well, the first General Assembly of the Plenary Council is over! Meanwhile the Steering and Drafting Committees will continue working on the proposals made during last week; this will continue to up until next July when the second and final Assembly takes place in Sydney; perhaps with more input from some of the "small groups". Thankfully I am not on either Committee, however Bishop Paul is. Probably the first question everyone would like to know is - was it successful? I would have to say 'yes.' Before joining our individual 'small groups' we were asked to preference 6 of the 16 questions to be discerned, in order of interest. My first choice was, "How might parishes better become local centres for the formation and animation of missionary disciples?" and that is the group to which I was assigned. There is lot to unpack in that question as there was in each of the 16 questions, but it is the one that I felt was the most urgent because I want our parish and the whole Church in Australia to be dynamic and flourish. The Church is made up of parishes and ours is pretty typical of many in Australia, not discounting our size. However, the Church in Australia cannot flourish and be vibrant if our parishes are not. One of the criticisms people put forward about the Plenary was that it would be nothing more than a talk-fest, and nothing would come of it. I think they are proved wrong when, speaking from my groups point of view we came up with 4 concrete proposals regarding our question - something I did not think remotely possible late on Wednesday night. Yes, it was messy and there were disagreements over . . . a lot of things, but it was always honest and respectful. There were debates over the exact meaning of terms and what was meant by words such as 'parish' and 'missionary' and would it be generally understood? And just when we thought we were getting somewhere someone raised the valid point that we were actually dealing more with "formation of parishes" – which was not our department 燥

Yes, the First General Assembly did get somewhere, many groups came up with concrete proposals. I believe it is the start of a way ahead, a positive step towards a better future for our Church in Australia and that means each of us. A saying I had not heard before resonated and has stayed with me from the opening day "we cannot hurry the river." It will take time, as all good things do. Significantly, it is nine months until we meet again for the Second General Assembly of the Plenary Council. I wonder at what goodness it will bring to birth.
