ALTAR SERVERS AT THE CATHEDRAL

Both the Cathedral Parish Pastoral Council and Cathedral Liturgy Committee, have had a number of discussions regarding the return of Altar Servers to our Sunday Liturgies. Both groups feel that it is time, and with a number of criteria to support our young people taking on this ministry in our Cathedral community. Altar servers play a very visible part in parish life and their training and formation is very important. This is an opportunity for children to take on a role of service in the community and a chance to learn more about Liturgy. The altar servers' special ministry is to assist with the smooth flow of the liturgical rites. They serve on the sanctuary in areas and tasks relating to the altar and lectern.

Children who are interested in serving at our Masses must be fully initiated into our Catholic Faith – that is they must be Baptised, Confirmed and have made their First Communion. They should also be regular attendees at Mass on Sunday. They can be of various ages and of either gender.

The safety of altar servers is paramount and structures have been put in place at the Cathedral to ensure that our Altar servers are safe and are seen to be safe. Altar servers will be supervised prior to and after every Mass, by a carefully chosen adult with a working with children clearance. They will robe in the second sacristy and at all times will be supervised and prepared in open areas of the Cathedral. Parents are encouraged to support their children and take on the role of supervisor.

Parents should also note that when they agree to their child becoming an Altar Server, that they themselves are taking on the responsibility of having their children arrive at Mass on time and are strongly encouraged to stay and celebrate Mass with their children.

St Patrick's Cathedral is establishing Choral and Organ Scholarships.

Reflection on the Readings - Eleventh Sunday Ordinary Time Year A

The words of the Lord spoken to Moses preserved in the first reading for today describe events that transpired in the lives of those being addressed ('You have seen for yourselves'). Second, if this passage was part of Israel's covenant renewal ceremony, as many commentators believe it was, it is a liturgical remembering that makes present for a new generation the past events being remembered. Although God's goodness appears to be unconditional, covenant membership is not. 'If' God's voice is heeded, and 'if' the people comply with the covenant responsibilities, they will enjoy the privilege of covenant partnership. Although the covenant includes obligations, there is still a dimension of freedom present here. The people are free to choose partnership with God or not.

The few verses in the responsorial psalm come from a hymn of praise that calls Israel to worship its God. It calls the people to serve, to come before, and to know God. In the psalm God is characterised as creator and shepherd (v.3). The first image highlights the sovereignty of God; the second portrays the tender provident care of God. The response concludes with a description of God that consists of attributes associated with the covenant: goodness, lovingkindness, faithfulness. It is only right that we praise a God who is characterised as creator and shepherd and described as forever good, kind and faithful.

Paul teaches that justification was won through the blood of Christ. Human beings can only be righteous if they are in right relationship with God and share in God's righteousness. The transformation that takes place in the human-divine relationship is called reconciliation. This reconciliation/transformation has been won for believers by the Lord Jesus Christ, and he won this when they were still sinners. His dying made them righteous, saved them from ultimate peril, reconciled them with God. Paul ends his teaching by claiming that if such wondrous things can be accomplished through Christ's death, how much more will believers be blessed through his resurrected life!

In the scene described in today's gospel reading, the sight of the crowds moves Jesus profoundly. He does not merely feel sorry for the crowds; his compassion springs from his profound love for them. Their great need and the urgency of the moment prompt his words and actions. Though there is no mention of judgment in this passage, reference to the harvest certainly suggests this theme. The apostles are sent out having been given authority to cast out demons or unclean spirits and the ability to heal diseases. The ancients believed that when the reign of God was established, the reign of evil would come to an end. Therefore, they viewed exorcisms and healings as evidence that God's reign was taking hold in the world. The apostles are told to proclaim the arrival of this reign and to demonstrate its presence through wondrous acts.
