




We welcome Bishop Paul Bird to our Parish for his Visitation. We offer Bishop Paul

those in Homes and in Hospital.



Our Parish is made up of parishioners from many cultures: Ireland, Scotland, England, India, Italy, China, Netherlands, Sri Lanka, New Zealand, Philippines, Nigeria South Sudan, South Korea, Poland, Vietnam, Colombia.... Pope Francis: "Every person who seeks a home here is an encounter with Jesus Christ, who identi-

fies with them". The Holy Father says this "encounter "is fourfold welcome, protect, promote, integrate. Throughout the first years of my pontificate, I have repeatedly

expressed my particular concern for the lamentable situation of many migrants and refugees fleeing from war, persecution, natural disasters and poverty. This situation is undoubtedly a "sign of the times" which I have tried to interpret, with the help of the Holy Spirit, ever since my visit to Lampedusa on 8 July 2013. I hope a greater number of countries will adopt private and community sponsorship programs, open humanitarian corridors for particularly vulnerable refugees.



BALLARAT CLERGY SUPPORT FUND Collection for Sick/Retired Priests a LEAVING COLLECTION will be at all Masses on the weekend of September 8/9

Creating a secure retirement future for the priests of the diocese is a duty and care in which we can all participate. 15 retired priests are currently supported by this Fund. Some live privately, some are retired in units in Ballarat or elsewhere, others live in supported accommodation. The funding required for these commitments is ongoing. Thanks to your generosity, this collection has raised \$1.8 million since it started in 1991, including nearly \$48,000 in 2017. Along with the Priests' own contribution of \$37,000 per year, this annual collection has allowed the Fund to continue to support our sick and retired clergy.

Pope Francis Prayers for Victims of Kerala Floods Pope Francis prayed with pilgrims gathered for the Angelus in St. Peter's Square for the many victims of the floods in Kerala, India. As many as 350 are feared dead, with many more missing and thousands trapped by the flood waters. "Over the last days, intense rains which have caused flooding and landslides, with heavy losses of human lives, numerous people dispersed and displaced, and great damage to crops and homes have harshly tried the inhabitants of Kerala. 1st Reading: Joshua 24:1-2.15-18 Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel together at Shechem; then he called the elders, leaders, judges and scribes of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. Then Joshua said to all the people: 'If you will not serve the Lord, choose today whom you wish to serve, whether the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are now living. As for me and my House, we will serve the Lord.' Gospel Reflection. 21st Sunday Ordinary Yr B - Veronica Lawson If we have trouble understanding and coming to terms with the teachings of Jesus in the gospel, then we can take some comfort from the reaction of the disciples in John's community some decades after the death of Jesus. Not only the members of the Jewish synagogue were offended by his teaching, but those Jews who had accepted Jesus as Messiah and had joined the community of believers. "This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?" They are referring to his teaching on the "bread". Once again, Jesus' response is a new teaching that can only raise more questions. He links "spirit" with "life". Having used the term "flesh" of his body and of the life that he offers to those

Next Week's Gospel: Mark 7:1-8. 14-1 The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other hearted; those whose spirit is crushed he will save.

Many are the trials of the just man but from them all the Lord will rescue him. He will keep guard over all his bones, not one of his bones shall be broken.

Evil brings death to the wicked; those who hate the good are doomed. The Lord ransoms the souls of his servants. Those who hide in him shall not be condemned.

Taste and see the goodness of the Lord.

2nd Reading: Ephesians 5:21-32

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives submit to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks

who eat of his flesh, he now introduces an element of doubt: flesh is now "useless"! We must be careful not to interpret this literally. It is typical of John to use the same word in a variety of ways. Here "flesh" refers to human weakness and sinfulness in contrast with "spirit" which evokes the creative spirit of God that moved over the waters at creation and the spirit of God that informed the word of the prophets. The Johannine Jesus offers deeper insights into his identity and destiny and into the meaning of the Christian life. The reference to his "ascending" recalls where he is presented as the one who comes from God and has already ascended to God (John 3:13). After his death, Jesus will tell Mary Magdalene that he has not yet ascended and

observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture: This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me. The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are

after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body - and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church.

Acclamation: cf John 6:63. 68

Alleluia, alleluia! Your words, Lord, are spirit and life: you have the words of everlasting life. Alleluia!

Gospel: John 6:60-69

After hearing his doctrine many of the followers of Jesus said, 'This is intolerable language. How could anyone accept it?' Jesus was aware that his followers were complaining about it and said, 'Does this upset you? What if you should see the Son of Man ascend to where he was before? 'It is the spirit that gives life, the flesh has nothing to offer. The words I have spoken to you are spirit and they are life. 'But there are some of you who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the outset those who did not believe, and who it was that would betray him. He went on, 'This is why I told you that no one could come to me unless the Father allows him.' After this, many of his disciples left him and stopped going with him. Then Jesus said to the Twelve, 'What about you, do you want to go away too?' Simon Peter answered, 'Lord, who shall we go to? You have the message of eternal life, we believe; we know that you are the Holy One of God.'

instructs her to tell the disciples that he is ascending to God (20:17). It seems that John wants to keep emphasising the origins of Jesus as the eternal Word and the Wisdom of God. Many refuse the implications of his teaching and they turn away. Jesus asks his closest followers if they too will desert. Peter speaks for himself and his companions when he declares their undying allegiance: "To whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life." Eternal life is the Johannine equivalent of the "kingdom of God" or "of the heavens" of the other gospels. Peter's declaration is a sobering one for us in times of doubt and an encouragement for those of us who seek to understand more deeply and to keep believing despite the challenges.

only human regulations. You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.' He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these things come from within
