Making Connections: This week's Psalm response offers great wisdom: Lord, you have the words of everlasting life.

Sharing the Tradition: The gospel readings for the next three weeks are taken from the Gospel of John. reflects in some way on the paschal mystery; that is, the life, death and resurrection of legus in his own time but also as it continues

Jesus declares himself the new temple. True worship of God is now centred in Jesus himself, the embodiment of God, we are 'temples' of the Holy Spirit. Marriage Tip: If one must choose the hardest stage of parenthood, it might be the teen years. They're too big to carry to their room but too young to always make good decisions. Assure your teen that you will always love them. Daily Prayer: Holy is your name, O Lord our God. Incline our hearts to keep your commandments, and school us in the sublime wisdom of the cross, so that, free from sin, which imprisons us in our own self-centredness, we may open ourselves to the gift of your Spirit and become living temples of your love.

#### 1st Reading: Exodus 20:1-17

The Lord spoke all these words. He said, 'I am the Lord your God who brought you out of the house of slavery. 'You shall have no gods except me. You shall not make yourself a carved image or any likeness of anything in heaven or earth beneath or in the waters under the earth; you shall not bow down to them or serve them. For I, the Lord your God am a jealous God and I punish the father's fault in the sons, the grandsons, and the great-grandsons of those who hate me; but I show kindness to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments. 'You shall not utter the name of the Lord your God to misuse it, for the Lord will not leave unpunished the man who utters his name to misuse it. 'Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work, but the seventh day is a sabbath for the Lord your God. You shall do no work on that day, neither you nor your animals nor the stranger who lives with you. For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth and the sea and all that these hold, but on the seventh day he rested; that is why the Lord has blessed the sabbath day and made it sacred. 'Honour your father and your mother so that you may have a long life in the land that the Lord your God has given to you. 'You shall not kill. 'You shall not commit adultery. 'You shall not steal. 'You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour. 'You shall not covet your neighbour's house. You shall not covet your neighbour's wife, or his

servant, man or woman, or his ox, or his donkey, or anything that is his.'

2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:22-25 While the Jews demand miracles and the Greeks look for wisdom, here are we preaching a crucified Christ; to the Jews an obstacle that they cannot get over, to the pagans madness, but to those who have been called, whether they are Jews or Greeks, a Christ who is the power and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom,

#### John 2, 13-25

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said. During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave, but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them: he never needed evidence about any man; he could tell what a man had in him.

#### Gospel Reflection:3rd Sunday of Lent: Veronica Lawson RSM

Today's gospel passage foreshadows the death of Jesus. As a devout Jew, Jesus goes up to Jerusalem at Passover. His final going-up will be the occasion of his death and resurrection. The Jerusalem Temple, Judaism's most holy place, is the site of a dramatic incident, an event that is recounted in all four gospels. John's Gospel places it at the beginning of Jesus' ministry. The tension between Jesus and the temple authorities culminates in his death. Jesus acts decisively, even violently, to draw attention to the primary function of God's "house". He creates an effective weapon, a whip of cords, and clears the

temple precinct of merchants, sheep, and cattle. He overturns the tables of the moneychangers, orders the dove-sellers out and tells them all, in words that evoke the prophecy of Zechariah (14:21), to stop making God's house "a market-place". Zechariah had declared that, in the end times, there would no longer be traders in God's house. There was legitimate commercial activity associated with temple worship, such as the purchase of animals and doves for sacrifice, a practice we might now critique, and the conversion of money to pay the Temple tax. The traders seem to have forgotten that this activity was a means to an end and not an end in itself. In John's account, the disciples partially

understand: they interpret Jesus' actions in the light of Psalm 69:9: "It is zeal for your house that has consumed me". ʻ̃"The Jews" request a "sign for doing this". They ask Jesus to demonstrate the source of his authority for his actions. His response is a challenge: "Destroy this temple, and in three days, I will raise it up" "The Jews" misunderstand. The temple took forty-six years to build. It is his body that will be destroyed and raised up "in three days". The designation "the Jews" refers to those who reject Jesus as the Anointed One of God, the Christ. As we travel the journey to Jerusalem we are invited to keep everything in balance, to remember that God, not the opponents of Jesus, will have the final word in this

### Next Sunday's Gospel: John 3,14-21.

Jesus said to Nicodemus: "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. Those who believe in

him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already. because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. "And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. But those who do what is true come to the light, so that may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."
