Making Connections: Light a candle each night this week as you pray. Proclaim God's truth and act for the light this week. Carry the light of the gospel wherever you go. Points of interest on Catholic life. Nicodemus was a Pharisee and a member of the ruling Council of the Jews, the Sanhedrin, He was attracted to the teaching of Jesus but was afraid to openly become a supporter so he came to see Jesus during the darkness of night. We meet Nicodemus again in John's Gospel when he brings myrrh and aloes to anoint the body of Jesus after the crucifixion (Jn 19:39). Nicodemus' journey to faith is complete as he acknowledges Jesus. Marriage Tip: When children come along, it can be easy to focus all your attention on parenting. But don't let your kids take up all your time and neglect your spouse! Children benefit most from a strong marriage. Consider having an intentional time alone with your spouse.

Daily Prayer: O God, the author and source of all light, you gaze into the depths of our inmost hearts. Never permit the powers of darkness to hold your people captive, but open our eyes by the grace of your Spirit, that we may be able to look on your Son and see the One you sent to illuminate the world, so that, seeing, we may believe and worship Jesus. *A Vocation View*: In baptism, we really become a new creation, fired with a new love, and aimed in a new direction - heaven. Let Jesus talk with you. Let Jesus challenge you.

1st Reading: 2 Chronicles 36:14-16. 19 All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity, copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy. Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed everything of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep sabbath throughout the days of its desolation.' And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: 'Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth; he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever

there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up."

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 136

Let my tongue be silenced, if I ever forget you!

By the rivers of Babylon there we sat and wept, remembering Zion; on the poplars that grew there we hung up our harps.

For it was there that they asked us, our captors, for songs, our oppressors, for joy. 'Sing to us,' they said, 'one of Zion's songs.' O how could we sing the song of the Lord on alien soil? If I forget you, Jerusalem, let my right hand wither! O let my tongue cleave my mouth if I remember you not, if I prize not Jerusalem above all my joys! Let my tongue be silenced, if I ever forget you!

2nd Reading: Ephesians 2:4-10

God loved us with so much love that he was generous with his mercy: when we were dead through our sins, he brought us to life with Christ - it is through grace that you have been saved - and raised us up with him and gave us a place with him in heaven, in Christ Jesus. This was to show for all ages to come, through his goodness towards us in Christ Jesus, how infinitely rich he is in grace. Because it is by grace that you have been saved, through faith; not by anything of your own, but by a gift from God; not by anything that you have done, so that nobody can claim the credit. We are God's work of art, created in Christ Jesus to live the good life as from the beginning he had meant us to live it.

Acclamation: John 3:16

Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ! God loved the world so much, he gave us his only Son, that all who believe in him might have eternal life. Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ!

Gospel: John 3, 14-21

Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. "And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. But those who do what is true come to the light, so that may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."

Gospel Reflection - 4th Sunday Lent Veronica Lawson rsm

The gospel for today is the concluding section of Jesus' conversation with a Pharisee called Nicodemus, who comes to him "by night". It features a number of typically Johannine themes: eternal life, believing, seeing, God's love, salvation, judgment, light, darkness, world, truth. We need to keep asking: how is this word to be understood ? In John, there is often much misunderstanding, this gives Jesus the opportunity to lead his hearers to a deeper understanding of his words. We operate out of a symbol system that belongs in a different time and a different place, hence the need to explore the traditions informing the stories. Today's reading evokes the Israelite tradition of the bronze serpent (Numbers 21:5-9);

the Israelites are unhappy with their lot in the desert. They complain about the food or lack of it. They blame both God and Moses. Their situation worsens with the outbreak of a plague of poisonous snakes. They interpret the plague as punishment for their sin of speaking against God. Moses intercedes with God, who instructs Moses to make an image of a fiery serpent and set it on a pole: anyone affected by snakebite has only to look upon the image to find life and healing. The bronze serpent is lifted up and those who "look upon it" find life. Life and death, seeing and believing in God's love and mercy are at the heart of the story of the bronze serpent. John taps into the memory of the emerging Christian community: just as the serpent was lifted up and the people found life, so will Jesus

Next Sunday's Gospel: John 12,20-30

Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains a single grain but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. "Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honour. "Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say— 'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice be lifted up and those who believe in him will find life. In John's gospel, seeing is often equated with believing which leads to "life" and God's saving love for "the world". Most of the themes of love and being raised up in this passage have already been introduced in the prologue to the gospel. Here for the first time in the gospel, God's saving activity is expressed in terms of "love". God's love is explicitly related to the gift of Jesus, God's Son, for the salvation of the world. Salvation resides in acceptance of Jesus, judgment in the refusal to accept Jesus as the revelation of God. Later in this gospel (12:33), Jesus will again reference the bronze serpent story in an expansive embrace of all creation: "And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all to myself.'

came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An Angel has spoken to him." Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. When I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw all people to myself." Jesus said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.
