Making Connections: What does it mean to love one another as Christ loved us? In John's Gospel there is no account of the Last Supper; instead, John tells us of Jesus washing the feet of his disciples, an act of absolute service to others, and a long discourse of instruction on how they must conduct themselves in the future. The heart of today's gospel lies in Jesus repeating himself: 'Love one another'. Living the Word: Jesus emphasises the closeness and intimacy between himself and the disciples. He speaks of this relationship in a radical way when he names them friends, which implies equality, an openness and sharing of life and experience, a mutual concern and interest. How does this image of friendship and intimacy challenge you? Marriage Tip: Make time to spend together talking, listening, praying, laughing, being playful and reconnecting. No matter how busy you are, make that time for each other . Daily Prayer: Your love, O God, is revealed among us in the gift of your Son Jesus, who laid down his life and bestows on us the joy of abiding in your love. We pray that through the witness we bear you will bring forth fruit that will last, and teach us, God of love, how to love one another. A Vocation View: God's love for us has been revealed: "Love one another as I have loved you. The world is in need to see people who are striving to love others with all their hearts. What about you?

World Communication Day - Today 6th May

Pope Francis has given a radical 'antidote' for the 'virus' of fake news, namely purification by the truth. The Holy Father did so when denouncing 'fake news' in his message for the 52nd World Communications Day, titled 'The truth will set you free" (Jn 8:32). In the message, the Pope reminds that human communication is an essential and beautiful part of life, but warns that distorted communications can cause much harm. Examining how to "recognize" such false news, the Pontiff reminds that when the truth is manipulated, it is not just 'the public' or 'an audience,' that is affected, but real people. 'How do we defend ourselves from this?' Francis responds "In today's fast-changing world of communications and digital systems, we are witnessing the spread of what has come to be known as "fake news." The Pope stressed his desire to contribute to "our shared commitment" to prevent the spread of fake news and to rediscovering the dignity of journalism and the personal responsibility of journalists to communicate the truth. Fake news is a sign of intolerant and hypersensitive attitudes, and leads only to the spread of arrogance and hatred, which he said, is the end result of untruth. "None of us can feel exempted from the duty of countering these falsehoods," he noted, while acknowledging that this is no easy task. "Yet preventing and identifying the way disinformation works," he went on to say, "also calls for a profound and careful process of discernment." "Constant contamination" by deceptive language, the Pope said, can end up darkening our interior life. "So how do we defend ourselves? The most radical antidote to the virus of falsehood is purification by the truth." The Holy Father encouraged communicators to realize that we discover and rediscover the truth when we experience it within ourselves in the loyalty and trustworthiness of the One who loves us. This alone, he said, can liberate us. To discern the truth, we need to discern everything that encourages communion and promotes goodness from whatever instead tends to isolate, divide, and op-

Peace, the Pope said, is the true news. The best antidotes to falsehoods, are not strategies, but people, people who wish to listen and are interested in sincere dialogue to make the truth emerge.

Our Parish welcomes the Principals of our Diocese and Northern Zone on Thursday & Friday. You are welcome to Mass Thursday at 5.30 with them.

1st Reading: Acts 10:25-26. 34-35. 44-As Peter reached the house Cornelius went out to meet him, knelt at his feet and prostrated himself. But Peter helped him up. 'Stand up', he said 'I am only a man after all!' Then Peter addressed them: 'The truth I have now come to realise' he said 'is that God does not have favourites, but that anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him.' While Peter was still speaking the Holy Spirit came down on all the listeners. Jewish believers who had accompanied Peter were all astonished that the gift of the Holy Spirit should be poured out on the pagans too, since they could hear them speaking strange languages and proclaiming the greatness of God. Peter himself then said, 'Could anyone refuse the water of baptism to these people, now they have received the Holy Spirit just as much as we have?' He then gave orders for them to be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ. Afterwards they begged him to stay on for some days.

The Lord has revealed to the nations his saving power.

2nd Reading: 1 John 4:7-10

My dear people, let us love one another since love comes from God and everyone who loves is begotten by God and knows God. Anyone who fails to love can never have known God, because God is love. God's love for us was revealed when God sent into the world his only Son so that we could have life through him; this is the love I mean: not our love for God, but God's love for us when he sent his Son to be the sacrifice that takes our sins away.

Acclamation: John 14:23
Alleluia, alleluia! All who love me will

keep my words, and my Father will love them and we will come to them. Alleluia!

Gospel: John 15:9-17

Jesus said to his disciples: 'As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you. Remain in my love. If you keep my commandments you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and remain in his love. I have told you this so that my own joy may be in you and your joy be complete. This is my commandment: love one another, as I have loved you. A man can have no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends, if you do what I command you. I shall not call you servants any more, because a servant does not know his master's business; I call you friends, because I have made known to you everything I have learnt from my Father. You did not choose me, no, I chose you; and I commissioned you to go out and to bear fruit, fruit that will last; and then the Father will give you anything you ask in my name. What I command you is to love one another.'

Gospel Reflection 6th of Easter Yr B -Veronica Lawson RSM

The constitutions of my religious institute remind me that "the tender mercy of our God has given us one another". The implications of this profoundly beautiful truth are spelt out thus: "In our communities, we try to live in the friendship of Christ's disciples [Jn 15:15]. To so live calls forth relationships of equality, a real acceptance of ourselves and others, a forgetfulness of anything that does not make love its message." Living in the friendship of Christ's disciples is at the heart of a gospel way of living. It is the commission at the heart of today's reading and seems to be exactly what Pope Francis wants to say to all believers in his new Apostolic Exhortation, Gaudete et Exultate (Rejoice and be Glad). As we listen to the proclamation of the gospel, we might attend to the repetition of "joy", the three-fold repetition of

"friends" and the nine-fold repetition of "love". We might attend to the way in which the pronouns I/my/me and you/ your function in the passage. We may also notice the reference to "commands" and "commandments".

We tend not to associate "commands" with friendship and love because those we count as our friends are not usually in the habit of commanding or ordering us to do what they want. We derive little joy from being told what to do. And yet, there is no resiling from the juxtaposition of these terms. God, imaged in the gospel passage as "Father", loves Jesus. Jesus remains or abides in God's love so deeply that this love flows on to his friends. They are to love one another as Jesus has loved them. This is his commandment or commission to them, and by extension to us. It directs them/us to live for each other and put their lives/our lives on the line for one another. It

means being faithful to the teaching of Jesus as he has been faithful to God's commandments.

Remaining in the love of God or of Jesus and doing what God or Jesus commands seem to be one and the same thing. In other words, love is not just an emotion: it is always expressed in action that is in tune with and for the sake of the other. The disciples need no further explanation. Jesus' whole life and his courage in the face of impending death have shown them what it means to love one another. Living in the friendship of Christ's disciples is not some abstract goal. Too often we affirm the goodness of our selfless companions on the journey only when we come to lay them to rest. As we approach the end of the Easter season, we might give thanks for the love of our friends, for their witness to holiness and for the joy that they bring to our lives.

Next Week's Gospel: Mark 16:15-20 Jesus showed himself to the Eleven, and said to them, 'Go out to the whole world, proclaim the Good News to all creation. He who believes and is baptised will be saved; he who does not believe will be condemned. These are the signs that will be associated with believers: in my name they will cast out devils; they will have the gift of tongues; they will pick up snakes in their hands, and be unharmed should they drink deadly poison; they will lay their hands on the sick, who will recover.' And so the Lord Jesus, after he had spoken to them, was taken up into heaven: there at the right hand of God he took his

place, while they, going out, preached everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the word by the signs that accompanied it.
