'Volunteering is time willingly given for the common good and without financial gain.'

Sharing the Tradition: The situation of the church has changed again and again through its 2000-year history. In the beginning were periods of persecution and violence; these gave way to a settled period and gradual growth. The church has enjoyed times of strong political support and political power, and times, like now, of threat and decline. At times it has engaged in war to safeguard its position of dominance, and it has distanced itself from political power at other times. The ebbs and flows of the church's understanding of itself and its role in the world are fascinating. Vatican II spoke of how God, who spoke in the past, 'continues to converse' with the church (Dei Verbum §8). Through the Plenary Council 2020, the Catholic Church in Australia hopes to enter more intensely into that divine-human dialogue. What are the challenges facing the church today, and where do you think the guidance of the Spirit is needed now?

Making Connections: Stand up for someone who may be in need of a defender. Take on the role of an advocate. Alternatively, you could try to bring the gift of peace to someone whose heart is troubled or afraid.

Did You Know?: The meaning of the word advocate is 'one who is summoned to help another' used for the Holy Spirit as Paraclete, a Greek term meaning 'called to the side of. Exploring the Word: Disciples should live out their faith in Jesus' absence: they must keep his word, the word of God. Jesus has promised to send the Advocate or the Holy Spirit, who will continue to unfold the word as the church grows and meets new situations and challenges. In conferring the gift of peace on his disciples, Jesus is preparing them for his absence. This will be a trial for the disciples, but the peace of Christ and the Holy Spirit will help them to understand his return to the Father and to be confident that they too will one day make that journey. In what way do you experience Christ's presence? How do you experience the Spirit in life? Daily Prayer. You have promised, O God, to make your home with those who hear your word and put it into practice. Send your Spirit to remind our hearts of all that Jesus has taught us and to make us effective witnesses to your saving plan for all the world. Marriage Tip: When talking to your spouse, make your tone and language reflect love. Avoid accusatory or defensive language and use language that lets your spouse know she/he is special. Vocational View: It is not that talents add up to a vocation; but rather a Vocation brings talents. The Spirit of God lives within you!

GROUNDED WITH COURAGE

This Sunday marks National Sorry Day, when we remember our country's troubled history with First Nations peoples. It is the start of National Reconciliation Week. The theme of the week this year is, 'Grounded in truth-Walk together with courage'. First Reading: Acts 15:1-2, 22-29

Some men came down from Judaea and taught the brothers, 'Unless you have yourselves circumcised in the tradition of Moses you cannot be saved.' This led to disagreement, and after Paul and Barnabas had a long argument with these men it was arranged that Paul and Barnabas and others of the church should go up to Jerusalem and discuss the problem with the apostles and elders. Then the apostles and elders decided to choose delegates to send to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas; the whole church concurred with this. They chose Judas known as Barsabbas and Silas, both leading men in the brotherhood, and gave them this letter to take with them: 'The apostles and elders, your brothers, send greetings to the brothers of pagan birth in Antioch, Syria and Cilicia. We hear that some of our members have disturbed you with their demands and have unsettled your minds. They acted without any authority from us, and so we have decided unanimously to elect delegates and to send them to you with Barnabas and Paul, men we highly respect who have dedicated their lives to the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Accordingly we are sending you Judas and Silas, who will confirm by word of mouth what we have written in this letter. It has been decided by the Holy Spirit and by ourselves not to saddle you with any burden beyond these essentials: you are to abstain from food sacrificed to idols, from blood, from the meat of strangled animals and from fornication.

Avoid these, and you will do what is right. Farewell.'

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 66:2-3, 5-6, 8 O God, let all the nations praise you! O God, be gracious and bless us and let your face shed its light upon us. So will your ways be known upon earth and all nations learn your saving help.

Let the nations be glad and exult for you rule the world with justice. With fairness you rule the peoples, you guide the nations on earth.

Let the peoples praise you, O God; let all the peoples praise you. May God still give us his blessing till the ends of the earth revere him.

O God, let all the nations praise you! Second Reading: Revelation 21:10-14, In the spirit, the angel took me to the top of an enormous high mountain and showed me Jerusalem, the holy city, coming down from God out of heaven. It had all the radiant glory of God and glittered like some precious jewel or crystal-clear diamond. The walls of it were of a great height, and had twelve gates; at each of the twelve gates there was an angel, and over the gates were written the names of the twelve tribes of Israel; on the east there were three gates, on the north three gates, on the south three gates, and on the west three gates. The city walls stood on twelve foundation stones, each one of which

bore the name of one of the twelve apostles of the Lamb. I saw that there was no temple in the city since the Lord God Almighty and the Lamb were themselves the temple, and the city did not need the sun or the moon for light, since it was lit by the radiant glory of God and the Lamb was a lighted torch for it.

Gospel Acclamation: John 14:23 Alleluia, alleluia! All who love me will keep my words, and my Father will love them and we will come to them. Alleluia!

Gospel: John 14:23-29

Jesus said to his disciples: 'If anyone loves me he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we shall come to him and make our home with him. Those who do not love me do not keep my words. And my word is not my own; it is the word of the one who sent me. I have said these things to you while still with you; but the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all I have said to you. Peace I bequeath to you, my own peace I give you, a peace the world cannot give, this is my gift to you. Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid. You heard me say: I am going away, and shall return. If you loved me you would have been glad to know that I am going to the Father. The Father is greater than I. I have told you this, before it happens, so that when it does happen you may believe.'

Gospel Reflection - Ascension -Sr Veronica Lawson rsm

"Take from my heart all painful anxiety." This is the prayer of the first Sister of Mercy, Catherine McAuley, echoing the words of the Johannine Jesus, "Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not let them be afraid." It is all a matter of love. Disciples of Jesus know that they need not be anxious or afraid "for perfect love casts out fear" (1 Jn 4:18). Today's gospel makes it clear that "love" finds expression in the keeping of God's word. In the prologue to his Gospel, John presents Jesus as the Word, the Logos who has been with God from the beginning. Jesus is the word of God in human form, the embodiment of God's communication with us. Jesus keeps God's word. Disciples demonstrate their love for Jesus by keeping the word that he both embodies and proclaims, they are

to live as Jesus has lived and be faithful to what he has taught in God's name. They will thus become a dwelling place for the divine. The implications of this teaching are overwhelming. If we truly believed and "kept" the words of Jesus, we might be more inclined to treat each other and "our common home" with the utmost reverence and respect. Jesus refers once more to his imminent departure. When he is no longer physically present, God's Advocate, the Holy Spirit, will be with them. The Greek word translated as "advocate" literally means "one called alongside to help" whenever necessary. The disciples need not be troubled or afraid because they are never alone. The Holy Spirit, the Advocate, is always with them to defend them, to intercede for them, to comfort them, as well as to keep them focussed on all that Jesus has said to them. Earlier in this

chapter, the Advocate is called the Spirit of Truth who remains with them and is actually in them. Only through the power of the Spirit will the disciples be empowered to "keep the word" of Jesus. Jesus gifts his friends with peace, a peace "that the world cannot give." In John's gospel, the "world" is foremost the tenting place of God's Word: it is God's creation. Occasionally, it refers to whatever is opposed to Jesus as God's Word. The gift of peace that Jesus brings is a peace that casts out fear. It carries all the weight of the Hebrew shalom: it brings total well-being and peace of mind. True peace comes from being centred in God and gathering in all of God's creation. As Jesus leaves them, the proper stance for the disciples is joy in the knowledge that, although he is going away, he is also "coming to them" since the "Father" will send the Spirit to be with them always.

Next Week's Gospel: Luke 24:46-53 Jesus said to his disciples: 'You see how it is written that the Christ would suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that, in his name, repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses to this. 'And now I am sending down to you what the Father has promised. Stay in the city then, until you are clothed with the power

from on high.' Then he took them out as far as the outskirts of Bethany, and lifting up his hands he blessed them. Now as he blessed them, he withdrew from them and was carried up heaven. They worshipped him and then went back to Jerusalem full of joy; and they were continually in the Temple praising God.
