

Dr Rachel Carling-Jenkins, State Member for Western Metropolitan Region, has introduced the Infant Viability Bill and we **must** support it. It is scheduled to be debated in Parliament on the 25th May. This is the first formal attempt at pro-life legislation in Victoria in decades, and the first

legislative attempt to remedy the Abortion Law Reforms of 2008. Under this Bill: 1. Abortions would no longer be allowed from the 24th week of pregnancy. 2. Infant viability will be promoted and supported (all infants born alive from the 24th week onwards, including medical emergency, must be cared for with the intent to save the infant's life). FIND TIME TO PRAY. The easiest and quickest prayer is the examination of conscience popularized by St. Ignatius Loyola Review your day at night. 5 steps: 1. Presence: Remind yourself you're in God's presence. 2. Gratitude: Call to mind whatever you are grateful for that day: from a job well done, to lunch with a friend, to a consoling phone call, etc. Savor all those things and thank God. 3. Review: Think about the day from start to finish, trying notice where God was. When did you experience God? What was your response? 4. Sorrow: How did I respond to God's invitation, or even sinned. Ask God for forgiveness. 5. Grace: Ask for God's grace next day.

1st Reading Acts 1:1-11

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is' he had said 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.' Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.' As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 46:2-3. 6-9

God mounts his throne to shouts of joy: a blare of trumpets for the Lord.

All peoples, clap your hands, cry to God with shouts of joy! For the Lord, the Most High, we must fear, great king over all the earth.

God goes up with shouts of joy; the Lord goes up with trumpet blast. Sing praise for God, sing praise, sing praise to our king, sing praise.

God is king of all the earth. Sing praise with all your skill. God is king over the nations; God reigns on his holy throne.

God mounts his throne to shouts of joy: a blare of trumpets for the Lord.

2nd Reading: Hebrews 9:24-28. 10:19-It is not as though Christ has entered a man-made sanctuary which was only modelled on the real one; but it was heaven itself, so that he could appear in the actual presence of God on our behalf. And he does not have to offer himself again and again, like the high priest going into the sanctuary year after year with the blood that is not his own, or else he would have had to suffer over and over again since the world began. Instead of that, he has made his appearance once and for all, now at the end of the last age, to do away with sin by sacrificing himself. Since men only die once, and after that comes judgment, so Christ, too, offers himself only once to take the faults of many on himself, and when he appears a second time, it will not be to deal with sin but to

reward with salvation those who are waiting for him. In other words, brothers, through the blood of Jesus we have the right to enter the sanctuary, by a new way which he had opened for us, a living opening through the curtain, that is to say, his body. And we have the supreme high priest over all the house of God. So as we go in, let us be sincere in heart and filled with faith, our mind sprinkled and free from any trace of bad conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us keep firm in the hope we profess, because the one who made the promise is faithful.

Acclamation: Matthew 28:19. 20 Alleluia, alleluia! Go and teach all people my gospel. I am with you always, until the end of the world. Alleluia!

Gospel: Luke 24:46-53

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You see how it is written that the Christ would suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that, in his name, repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses to this. 'And now I am sending down to you what the Father has promised. Stay in the city then, until you are clothed with the power from on high.' Then he took them out as far as the outskirts of Bethany, and lifting up his hands he blessed them. Now as he blessed them, he withdrew from them and was carried up heaven. They worshipped him and then went back to Jerusalem full of joy; and they were continually in the Temple praising God.

Gospel Reflection—Ascension Yr C, Sr Veronica Lawson rsm .

Loss is part of the human condition, and death is one of the most painful manifestations of loss. Today's Feast of the Ascension invites us to face the experience of loss in a transformative way. In Ordinary Time, we celebrate the life and ministry of Jesus. Over the period of Lent and Easter, we have been remembering his death and resurrection. As we come towards the end of the Easter season, the liturgy draws us into another aspect of the Mystery, that of the presence and absence of Jesus who has been raised. The Ascension story as found in today's first reading (Acts 1:1-11) presupposes a pre-scientific, three-tiered understanding of the structure of the world. In this ancient view, God is in the

heavens above and the prophet Jesus, like the prophet Elijah of old, is caught up into God's realm from whence the Holy Spirit will 'descend' upon God's people. This vertical (up and down) movement is balanced by a horizontal movement: Jesus' family and friends who grieve the loss of their loved one are told not to keep looking up to the heavens. They have work to do: they must return to Jerusalem for the present and be empowered by the Holy Spirit to continue the prophetic ministry of Jesus ("clothed with power from on high"), to be his witnesses to the ends of the earth. They have to face the fact that the physical loss of Jesus means a new and different sort of presence and that they have a role to play in making him present in their world. Like us, the early

Christians needed time to grasp each dimension of the one great Mystery of God's life in their midst. The disciples who are gathered in Jerusalem, and not simply the Eleven, are to be witnesses to the death and resurrection of Jesus. They are to proclaim a gospel of repentance and forgiveness. In the gospel (Luke 24:47) their audience is 'all peoples", while in Acts 1:8, they are commissioned to be witnesses to Jesus "in all Jerusalem, in Judaea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth". Joy, prayer, and blessing have the final word in Luke's gospel. They have permeated the gospel story from the outset. As we prepare for the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, we might reflect on the blessings in our lives and pray for the same spirit of joy that animated the earliest Christians.

Next Week's Gospel - John 14:15-16, Jesus said to his disciples 'If you love me you will keep my commandments. I shall ask the Father and he will give you another Advocate to be with you for ever. 'If anyone loves me he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we shall come to him and make our home with him. Those who do not love me do not keep my words. And my word is not my own; it is the word of the one who sent me. I have said these things to

you while still with you; the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all I have said to you.'
