First Reading 2 Kgs 4:42-44 He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly A man came from Baal-shalishah, bringing Elisha, the man what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred of God, bread from the first-fruits, twenty barley loaves denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece and fresh grain in the ear. 'Give it to the people to eat,' each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, Elisha said. But his servant replied, 'How can I serve this to said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and a hundred men?' 'Give it to the people to eat' he insisted two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to 'for the Lord says this, "They will eat and have some left them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of over."' He served them; they ate and had some over, as grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. the Lord had said. Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.

The hand of the Lord feeds us; he answers all our needs. 1. All your creatures shall thank you, O Lord, and your friends shall repeat their blessing. They shall speak of the glory of your reign and declare your might, O God. (R.) 2. The eyes of all creatures look to you and you give them their food in due time. You open wide your hand, grant the desires of all who live. (R.) 3. The Lord is just in all his ways and loving in all his deeds. He is close to all who call him, who call on him from their hearts. (R.)
