#### Reflection on Pope Francis' Message WORLD COMMUNICATIONS DAY 2016

In one of the most quoted sayings attributed to St Francis of Assisi he urges his followers, 'Preach the Gospel always, and sometimes in words'. Pope Francis has helped to make the saying popular by the striking gestures with which he commends faith. Pictures of the Pope darting into a crowd, with panicky security men trailing behind, to embrace a sick person, or in gaol on Holy Thursday washing the tattooed feet of a young Muslim woman, say more than could any book or sermon about what God is like and about how Jesus' followers should behave. St Francis' line is worth keeping in mind on World Communications Day. When we think of communicating better, we can instinctively imagine it means more writing, more words. But that is a shallow view. Communicating better is not about more, but about deeper and more effective. Today many people complain that there are too many words and too many images. Our challenge is to pick our way through them in order to recognise what is true and what matters. Then our task is to talk about what matters and to let go of the rest. The technological solution to being overwhelmed by too many communications is to filter out what we do not want to know. We use search engines or media surveys. But these devices make us dependent on other people's judgment about what matters and what is true. If our search engines and other filters are provided by firms which rely on advertising, their judgment of what matters may be based on what is profitable to them and on what confirms our prejudices. Communication then turns into barracking. On Communications Day we should focus less on technology than on education in the habits of heart and mind. We learn to discern what matters and what is true. This means building within our lives a space, freed free from distraction by the latest technologies, to leave space for quiet personal reflection and deep conversation about what matters and what is true. Although it is important to use communication technology creatively, the more important task is to develop habits of reflection and discernment in response to the unfocused nature of contemporary communication. In a world of customised words simple actions speak loudly. In our work with vulnerable young people, its fruitfulness depends on the extent to which the ways in which we interact with them speak of availability, greeting, faithfulness and hope.

#### 1st Reading: Acts 2:1-11

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech. Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome - Jews and proselytes alike -Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

Gospel Reflection-Pentecost Yr C, Sr Veronica Lawson rsm . Pentecost Sunday is often called the birthday of the Church. For the ancient Israelites, Pentecost (meaning 'fiftieth') was a harvest festival celebrated fifty days after the harvesting of the first sheaf. When the Jerusalem temple was built, this harvest festival was transformed into a pilgrimage feast to celebrate the covenant that Israel had made with God on Mt Sinai. The Jews of the first century, including Christian Jews, celebrated the great pilgrimage feast of Pentecost. Several decades after the death of Jesus, the early Christians reflected on their origins and chose this feast to mark the birth of God's new covenant with God's people. In today's first reading (Acts 2:1-11), Luke tells the new Pentecost story in symbolic language that evokes the story

Next Week's Gospel - John 16:12-15 Jesus said to his disciples: 'I still have many things to say to you but they would be too much for you now. But when the Spirit of truth comes he will lead you to the complete truth, since he will not be speaking as from himself but will say only what he has learnt; and he will tell you of the things to come. He will glorify me since all he tells you will be taken how great you are, How many are your works, O Lord! The earth is full of your riches.

You take back your spirit, they die, returning to the dust from which they came. You send forth your spirit, they are created; and you renew the face of the earth.

May the glory of the Lord last for ever! May the Lord rejoice in his works! May my thoughts be pleasing to him. I find my joy in the Lord.

Lord, send out your Spirit and renew the face of the earth.

2nd Reading: Romans 8:8-17 People who are interested only in unspiritual things can never be pleasing to God. Your interests, however, are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him. Though your body may be dead it is because of sin, but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself because you have been justified; and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you. So then, my brothers, there is no necessity for us to obey our unspiritual selves or to live unspiritual lives. If you do live in that

of Moses and the people of Israel receiving God's Law on Mt. Sinai. Just as God's presence to Israel was marked by earthquake and thunder and fire, so God's Spirit enveloping the people of the new covenant appears in a mighty rush of wind and tongues of fire. Luke's account also evokes early rabbinic teaching that the voice of God on Sinai divided into seventy tongues and all the nations received the Law in their own tongues. In other words, the dispersion and division created by the hubris of those who built the Tower of Babel is symbolically reversed in this pouring out of God's Spirit. For the content of the new covenant, we turn to the gospel reading from John 20:19-23. The risen Christ appears to the disciples who are huddled behind locked doors. He offers the simple greeting: "Peace be with you," the greeting we offer each other at

The spirit you received is not the spirit of slaves bringing fear into your lives again; it is the spirit of sons, and it makes us cry out, 'Abba, Father!' The Spirit himself and our spirit bear witness that we are children of God. And if we are children we are heirs as well: heirs of God and coheirs with Christ, sharing his sufferings so as to share his glory.

**Gospel: John 14:15-16. 23-26** Jesus said to his disciples 'If you love me you will keep my commandments. I shall ask the Father and he will give you another Advocate to be with you for ever. 'If anyone loves me he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we shall come to him and make our home with him. Those who do not love me do not keep my words. And my word is not my own; it is the word of the one who sent me. I have said these things to you while still with you; but the Advocate the Holy Spirit whom the

Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all I have said to you.'

every Eucharistic celebration. He sends them on a mission of peace in continuity with his own God-inspired mission. He breathes on them the gift of the Holy Spirit and tells them that God will forgive those whom they forgive, and will 'retain' or 'seize hold of' the transgressions of those whose sins or transgressions they 'retain'. To seize hold of evil-doing is to expose it and deal with it. Sometimes it is best to forgive and simply allow everyone to move on. Amnesty only exacerbates the problems. Much of the enduring conflict in our world derives from the inability of ordinary people and of leaders to know how to deal with transgression. The Holy Spirit is the unique source of our power to forgive, of our power to refrain from vengeance, and of our capacity to deal with or 'seize hold of' the sins of the perpetrators of violence and abuse in our Church our world.
