FIRST READING

Isaiah 9:1-7

A Son is given to us

The people that walked in darkness has seen a great light; on those who live in a land of deep shadow a light has shone. You have made their gladness greater, you have made their joy increase; they rejoice in your presence as men rejoice at harvest time, as men are happy when they are dividing the spoils.

For the yoke that was weighing on him, the bar across his shoulders, the rod of his oppressor, these you break as on the day of Midian.

For all the footgear of battle, every cloak rolled in blood, is burnt, and consumed by fire.

For there is a child born for us, a son given to us and dominion is laid on his shoulders; and this is the name they give him: Wonder-Counsellor, Mighty-God, Eternal-Father, Prince-of-Peace. GOSPEL

Luke 2:1-14

"In the town of David, a saviour has been born to you!"

Caesar Augustus issued a decree for a census of the whole world to be taken. This census – the first – took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria, and everyone went to his own town to be registered. So Joseph set out from the town of Nazareth in Galilee and travelled up to Judaea, to the town of David called Bethlehem, since he was of David's House and line, in order to be registered together with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. While they were there the time came for her to have her child, and she gave birth to a son, her first born. She wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger because there was no room for them at the inn.

In the countryside close by there were shepherds who lived in the fields and took it in turns to watch their flocks during the night. The angel of the Lord appeared to them and the glory of the Lord shone round them. They were terrified, but the angel said, 'Do not be afraid. Listen, I bring you news of great joy, a joy to be shared by the whole people. Today in the town of David a saviour has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. And here is a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger.' And suddenly with the angel there was a great throng of the heavenly host, praising God and singing:

'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and peace to men who enjoy his favour.'

Reflection on today's Readings by Fr Francis Fernandez

HUMILITY AND SIMPLICITY LEAD US TO RECOGNISE CHRIST IN OUR LIVES

It is the shepherds around Bethlehem whom the prophet Isaiah describes in today's First Reading: "on those who live in a land of deep shadow a light has shone."

They are the first and only people to learn the news of our Lord's birth on that first Christmas night. "On the other hand, today, millions throughout the world know of it. The light of that night in Bethlehem has reached many hearts — but nevertheless, at the same time, darkness remains. Sometimes the darkness seems even more intense ...

"The men of that night welcomed the news; they experienced great joy – the joy that comes forth from light. The world's darkness overcome by the light of the birth of God ...

"It does not matter that on this first night, the night of God's birth, the joy of that event should have reached only a few hearts: it does not matter. It is destined for every human heart! It is the joy of the whole human race, a superhuman joy! Could there be any greater joy than this, any greater Good News than this: man has been accepted by God so as to become his son in this Son of God who has become man?" (St John Paul II, homily at Midnight Mass, 25th December 1980.)

God also wanted those shepherds to be the first *bearers* of the news: "When they saw the child they repeated what they had been told about him, and everyone who heard it was astonished at what the shepherds had to say." (Luke 2:18.) In the same way Jesus reveals himself to us in the midst of the ordinary incidents of each day; and we need the same dispositions of simplicity and humility in order to reach him. It is possible that throughout our lives he gives us signs that mean nothing to us if we rely on human outlook. We must be alert to discovering Jesus in the simplicity of ordinary life, "wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger," without any showy manifestations.

Naturally, the shepherds would not have set out without taking gifts for the baby. In first-century Palestine, it was inconceivable that anybody should present himself before a respected person without a gift. The shepherds would take what they had; a lamb, cheese, butter, milk. Doubtless it is not far removed from reality to imagine the scene as it is portrayed in the countless Nativity scenes of our days and in the Christmas carols which Christians sing with child-like faith.

Mary and Joseph, surprised and delighted, invite the shy shepherds to come in and see the Child, to hold him, to sing to him, and to leave their gifts beside the manger. So many centuries later, how can we approach Jesus without presenting our own gifts?

Perhaps what Our Lady would most thank us for is a resolution that we are more devoted, more affectionate, more cheerful because we are conscious of our divine filiation — we too are sons and daughters of God.

Mary and Joseph are inviting us to go in. And once inside we join the whole Church in saying to Jesus: "King of the universe, whom the shepherds found wrapped in swaddling clothes, help us always to imitate your poverty and your simplicity." (Lauds, 5th January.)

During these days of Christmas we sing with exultation because love will be among us till the end of time. The presence of the Child is Love among men; the world is no longer a place of darkness; those who seek for love know where to find it. It is essentially love that each one of us needs – even those who claim to be already fully satisfied.

Today, whenever we gaze at an image of the Child Jesus, or contemplate a Nativity scene, or meditate on this great mystery, let us thank God for having wanted to come down to us so that we could understand him and love him. Let us make up our minds to become as little children so as to enter one day into the kingdom of heaven. The whole Church prays today, "that we may share in the divinity of Christ, who humbled himself to share in our humanity."



THE YEAR OF ST JOSEPH

In, *Jesus Through Middle Eastern Eyes: Cultural Studies in the Gospels* (2009), Kenneth Bailey writes this about Joseph:

"In his cameo appearance, Matthew presents Joseph as a human being of remarkable spiritual stature. He possessed the boldness, daring, courage and strength of character to stand up against his entire community and take Mary as his wife. He did so in spite of the forces that no doubt wanted her stoned . . .

".. in the Middle East, men usually represent their families in any official or legal matters. Why did Joseph take Mary with him to Bethlehem for the registration? The easiest explanation is that he was unsure what might happen to her if he left her in Nazareth without his presence to protect her. It behooves us to see Joseph as the hero of the story without whose courage and understanding of the prophets there would have been no Christmas story to tell."
