So he came to a Samaritan city called Sychar, near the plot of ground that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired out by his journey, was sitting by the well. It was about noon. A Samaritan woman came to draw water, and Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." (His disciples had gone to the city to buy food.) The Samaritan woman said to him, "How is it receiving wages and is gathering fruit for that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of eternal life, so that sower and reaper may Samaria?" (Jews do not share things in common rejoice together. For here the saying holds true, with Samaritans.) Jesus answered her, "If you 'One sows and another reaps.' I sent you to knew the gift of God and who it is that is saying to reap that for which you did not labour. Others you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, have laboured, and you have entered into their and he would have given you living water."

They left the city and were on their way to him. Meanwhile the disciples were urging him, "Rabbi, eat something." But he said to them, "I have food to eat that you do not know about." So the disciples said to one another, "Surely no one has brought him something to eat?" Jesus said to them, "My food is to do the will of him who sent me and to complete his work. Do you not say, 'Four months more, then comes the harvest'? But I tell you, look around you, and see how the fields are ripe for The reaper harvesting. is already labour." Many Samaritans from that city believed in him because of the woman's testimony, "He told me everything I have ever done." So when the Samaritans came to him, they asked him to stay with them, and he stayed there two days. And many more believed because of his word. They said to the woman, "It is no longer because of what you said that we believe, for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the Saviour of the world."


