



Dear Friends, John the Baptist prepares the way for Jesus. Today's gospel is a kind of prelude for Jesus by John. The gospel opens with a desert scene, with John the Baptist's character planted in the desert surroundings. He calls people to repent. While some Pharisees and Scribes saw him as possessed by demons because of his solitary life, ordinary people flock to him because they saw in him the Prophet of the Lord. It had been so long since the voice of a prophet had been heard in the land of Israel. The people were happy and realized that God was once again speaking to them. So they went to John the Baptist and received the baptism of repentance.

Today once more we hear the cry of John the Baptist calling for repentance. The spirit of Advent comes to awaken us to the truth of Jesus' coming and to get ready. We feel the need to prepare ourselves to welcome Jesus into our midst. So like the people in the time of John the Baptist, we have to repent from our old ways of life. It should not be merely in our words, but we need an inner conversion to change our hearts and minds according to the teaching of the gospel. So let us ask the Lord to give us His grace and the power of the Holy Spirit to turn towards God during the season of Advent. -Neville.

Second Sunday of Advent Year B December 6th 2020

LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading: -

A reading from the prophet Isiah.

Prepare the way for the Lord.

"Console my people, console them" says your God.

"Speak to the heart of Jerusalem and call to her that her time of service is ended, that her sin is atoned for, that she has received from the hand of the Lord double punishment for all her crimes."

A voice cries, "Prepare in the wilderness a way for the Lord. Make a straight highway for our God across the desert. Let every valley be filled in, every mountain and hill be laid low, let every cliff become a plain, and the ridges a valley; then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all mankind shall see it; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

Go up on a high mountain, joyful messenger to Zion. Shout with a loud voice, joyful messenger to Jerusalem. Shout without fear, say to the towns of Judah, "Here is your God." Here is the Lord coming with power, his arm subduing all things to him. The prize of his victory is with him, his trophies all go before him. He is like a shepherd feeding his flock, gathering lambs in his arms, holding them against his chest and leading to their rest the mother ewes.

This is the word of the Lord.

Second Reading:

A reading from the second letter of St. Peter (3:8-14).

We wait for new heavens and a new earth.

There is one thing my friends, that you must never forget: that with the Lord, a day can mean a thousand years and a thousand years is like a day. the Lord is not being slow to carry out his promises, as anybody else might be called slow; but he is being patient with you all, wanting nobody to be lost and everybody to be brought to change his ways. The day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then with a roar the sky will vanish, the elements will catch fire and fall apart, the earth and all that it contains will be burnt up.

Since everything is coming to an end like this, you should be living holy and saintly lives while you wait and long for the Day of God to come, when the sky will dissolve in flames and the elements melt in the heat. What we are waiting for is what he promised: the new heavens and new earth, the place where right-eousness will be at home. So then, my friends, while you are waiting, do your best to live lives without spot or stain so that he will find you at peace.

This is the word of the Lord.

Gospel Acclamation (Please stand for the Gospel Acclamation) Lk 3:4. 6 Alleluia, alleluia! Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths: all people shall see the salvation of God. Alleluia!

Gospel Reading: Mk 1:1-8

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark Make straight the paths of the Lord.

The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It is written in the book of the prophet Isaiah: Look, I am going to send my messenger before you; he will prepare your way. A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight,

and so it was that John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. All Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. John wore a garment of camel-skin, and he lived on locusts and wild honey. In the course of his preaching he said, 'Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'

This is the gospel of the Lord.
