

Dear Friends,

Jesus' story of ten bridesmaids waiting to meet the bridegroom in the middle of the night seems strange to most of us today, but Jesus' audience knew all too well that this could happen to them unpredictably. Wedding customs in ancient Palestine required extra vigilance and preparation for everyone involved and the celebration would continue for a whole week with their family and friends. There were many other customs and regulations to follow prior and post to wedding ceremonies. This could only be done with much preparation and predetermination — there are certain things that we cannot get at the last minute.

The lesson that we understand today is that we have to be vigilant and prepared. We know that the second coming of our Lord is true and he will come unexpectedly. Hence, when he comes to lead us to his heavenly kingdom, we will listen for his voice and follow him. Through the gospel today, Jesus gives us a warning that there will be consequences for being unprepared for his coming.

So let us ask ourselves: are we ready for his coming like the wise bridesmaids in the gospel? If not let us listen to him today and prepare ourselves for his coming. The Lord Jesus invites us to the feast in his kingdom. So let us ask the Lord to make us vigilant and attentive to his voice and hear his call so that we may enter into his kingdom.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading: Wis 6:12-16

A reading from the book of Wisdom

Wisdom is found by those who look for it. Wisdom is bright, and does not grow dim. By those who love her she is readily seen,

and found by those who look for her.

Quick to anticipate those who desire her, she makes herself known to them.

Watch for her early and you will have no trouble;

you will find her sitting at your gates.

Even to think about her is understanding fully grown; be on the alert for her and anxiety will quickly leave you. She herself walks about looking for those who are worthy of her and graciously shows herself to them as they go, in every thought of theirs coming to meet them.

Second Reading: 1 Thes 4:13-18 or [Shorter form 1 Thes 4:13-14] A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians

Those who died as Christians, God will bring to life with Jesus.

[We want you to be quite certain, brothers, about those who have died, to make sure that you do not grieve about them, like the other people who have no hope. We believe that Jesus died and rose again, and that it will be the same for those who have died in Jesus: God will bring them with him]. We can tell you this from the Lord's own teaching, that any of us who are left alive until the Lord's coming will not have any advantage over those who have died. At the trumpet of God, the voice of the archangel will call out the command and the Lord himself will come down from heaven; those who have died in Christ will be the first to rise, and then those of us who are still alive will be taken up in the clouds, together with them, to meet the Lord in the air. So we shall stay with the Lord for ever. With such thoughts as these you should comfort one another.

Gospel Reading: Mt 25:1-13

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Look, the bridegroom comes. Go out to meet him.

Jesus told this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven will be like this: Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish and five of them were sensible: the foolish ones did take their lamps, but they brought no oil, whereas the sensible ones took flasks of oil as well as their lamps. The bridegroom was late, and they all grew drowsy and fell asleep. But at midnight there was a cry, "The bridegroom is here! Go out and meet him." At this, all those bridesmaids woke up and trimmed their lamps, and the foolish ones said to the sensible ones, "Give us some of your oil: our lamps are going out." But they replied, "There may not be enough for us and for you; you had better go to those who sell it and buy some for yourselves." They had gone off to buy it when the bridegroom arrived. Those who were ready went in with him to the wedding hall and the door was closed. The other bridesmaids arrived later. "Lord, Lord," they said, "open the door for us." But he replied, "I tell you solemnly, I do not know you." So stay awake, because you do not know either the day or the hour.'
