TURNBULL AT RISK OVER SCHOOL FUNDING

The federal government is exposed to a voter backlash in 13 marginal seats along the eastern seaboard that could cost it power after igniting a row with the Catholic education sector, The Australian reports.

Analysis of the 13 seats along the eastern seaboard of NSW, Queensland and Victoria shows that almost 70,000 children were Catholiceducated in those seats last year.

The census data shows that the flow-on effect of the government's war with the Catholic sector could be electorally disastrous, particularly in Queensland, where up to seven seats could be impacted by a long-running church campaign. The poll comes as Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull faces internal pressure to end the war with the Catholic sector: the fight has spread beyond school funding and struck at the heart of the Catholic establishment, which has vowed to campaign against the Coalition.

Several senior Liberals have told The Australian that lobbying is under way to force federal Education Minister Simon Birmingham to build bridges with the Catholic community, amid concerns about the withholding of \$1.1 billion from Catholic schools after the new deal with the Senate crossbench on the Gonski 2.0 school package.

The \$1.1 bn "gap" has created a significant challenge for Senator Birmingham because the Catholic sector believes it provides an advantage to independent schools but he argues that it is a consequence of pushing all nongovernment schools into a consistent funding formula.

As federal and state Labor prepares to campaign alongside the Catholic sector, analysis of the census data shows the Coalition's biggest challenge will be in Queensland, where up to seven marginal seats will be influenced by the conflict. Four key marginals in NSW will be impacted directly and two in Victoria.

Senator Birmingham said Catholic schools would receive about \$3.4bn extra over the next 10 years as part of his overhaul.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION:

In the midst of Ordinary Time we are invited to behold the transfiguration of Christ. By some horrible coincidence, we recall Christ's brilliance on the day that the world marks another cosmic event, its birth into the atomic age at Hiroshima. The paradox of these events should not be lost on us. The white light that shone from Christ was a mere suggestion of the divine splendour that is beyond human comprehension; the flashing light from the atomic explosion was an omen of the destructive force that is within human grasp. It is imperative that the horror of the latter be brought under the control of the glory of the former.

The transfiguration was a moment in time when Jesus' divine glory broke through his humanity and shone with a brilliance that was blinding. We sing of this glory time and again in the psalms. Yet when it really appears we can hardly believe it ourselves. The readings outline three different moments when this glory was revealed. The first was reported by the visionary in the book of Daniel. The second moment was the scene of the transfiguration. The third is hidden in the resurrection testimony of the author of the Letter of Peter.

We are the ones who today possess the prophetic message; we are the present day eyewitnesses of Christ's majesty. We too have moments when we might behold his glory and hear the voice proclaiming his identity, but we need eyes of faith and ears that are open.
