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The Most Holy Trinity (C) Sunday 22nd May 2016



Scripture Reflection by Sr Veronica Lawson RSM

The opening sentence of today's gospel touches something very deep in human experience. Jesus tells his disciples: "I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now." In John's gospel, Jesus is depicted as sensitive to the anguish of his friends and to their limited capacity to absorb the enormity of what was happening to him and to them. There was only so much they could "bear" as the inevitability of Jesus' death dawned on them. They will come to understand who he is and what he has taught them, but only through the power of God's "Spirit of truth" who will guide them into "all the truth".

As we think back on our own lives and tell stories of the past, we realize how little we understood of what was happening in our world and in our own lives at the time of the events we recount. We become wiser with the knowledge of hindsight, even if we never fully understand. As Christians, we credit any insight and understanding we may have to the power of God's Spirit at work in our lives. We believe in the Triune God and, along with the whole Earth community, we are caught up into a wonderful dynamism of Trinitarian life.

No one image can capture the mystery of God's dynamic Trinitarian existence. Since God is neither male nor female, it is important to remember that the traditional male language of Father, Son and Spirit is one way of imaging the Trinity and is not to be absolutised or taken as a literal description of God who is three in one.

Perichoresis, a Greek term suggestive of dancing or of figures interweaving, is one of the earliest and probably one of the most striking images used to explain this Trinitarian life of God. The life that is in God is three and yet one in a totally harmonious dance of equals. The wonder is that we are invited to join the dance. Trinity Sunday is the day that we set aside to celebrate who God is in Godself and who God is in relation to everything that exists. We celebrate the nearness of the Triune God who draws us as participants into the dance of life and love. The Spirit of truth guides us "into all the truth". We continue to listen to the Spirit so that we might understand more fully the "things that are to come" and the relatedness we are called to live. The dance of Trinitarian love casts out hatred and enmity and wanton destruction. It calls us to live in harmony with one another and with the whole of the Earth community.

What makes a Catholic school Catholic? Principal Mark Hogbin wrote on the school newsletter: This guestion is up there with some of the most challenging issues that we face in our schools and the wider church today. It's not an easy question to answer and it often demands more of a reflective response than we might realize. If our answer is that a Catholic school is Catholic because we educate Catholic children then we would be wrong. Our school is made up of families who identify with many different faiths and some who might be experiencing formal religion for the first time. If Catholic schools existed for Catholic families only then we would have a very limited world view and any hopes for evangelisation would be lost. Perhaps Catholic schools exist because they are the new church? Wrong again. We are a part of the church but we are not a replacement for it. When School and Church work together then a holistic approach to faith formation and celebration can be achieved. We are a part of the church but we are certainly not a substitute for it! Some might say that we exist to offer a cheaper alternative for private education. Wrong again. The origins of Catholic education in this country are based around the right to educate in faith and to exercise freedom of religion. Not all countries provide Catholic education, either by law or by choice. I think that we are richer because we do. Many believe that because we teach from a values perspective we must be Catholic. An easy trap to fall into. All good schools regardless of identity teach values. This simply mirrors the kind of work that you are doing at home as parents when you prepare your children to be participants in a society which fosters the human person. You are doing a great job at this, so if it was for values alone then our school system would not need to exist. So, what does make a Catholic school Catholic? I don't have the complete answer, but I do think that I have some pointers which might help. If we believe that we are called to be Christ on earth for others then all of a sudden an identity begins to take shape. The words of St. Teresa of Avila come to mind:

> "Christ has no body but yours, No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes with which he looks Compassion on this world, Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good, Yours are the hands, with which he blesses all the world. Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, Yours are the eyes, you are his body. Christ has no body now but yours."

If we can be Christ-like in our interactions with others in our school then we can be sure that our school is Catholic, not just in name but in action also.
