

St Vincent de Paul Society Jesse Tree Christmas Appeal 2017

The Cathedral Parish Conference of the Society will again be distributing Christmas hampers to those less fortunate than most of us. Over the years as a Parish you have been extremely generous when we have sought your assistance not only at Christmas time but also with our Winter appeal. Last Christmas we were able to provide support to over 130 families and individuals as a result of your generosity.

Jesse Tree symbols will be distributed after each Mass commencing this weekend the Feast of Christ the King and throughout the Season of Advent. We again ask that you support our Jesse Tree Appeal through the donation of non-perishable food items. Vinnies Christmas Appeal envelopes are available in the pews for those wishing to make a cash donation to the appeal. Hampers will be delivered on Wednesday December 20th 2017 therefore it would be appreciated if non-perishable food items could be placed under the Jesse Tree prior to this date.

Youth Every Second Sunday (YESS)

The final YESS Youth for the year will be held this Sunday November 26^{th} after the 5pm Mass. Twenty young people from the Cathedral Parish have registered to attend the Australian Catholic Youth festival being held in Sydney, December $7^{th} - 9^{th}$. The Diocese of Ballarat will be providing the funding for bus transport of the young people to and from Sydney. The Cathedral Parish will contribute \$5,600 to cover the accommodation costs to stay in Sydney.

The Youth Festival will be the first event in what will be the Year of Youth with the theme *Opening new horizons for spreading joy: Young people, faith and vocational discernment.*

At 5.00 pm Mass next Sunday (December 3rd), Bishop Paul will commission those attending the festival.

What next after the Royal Commission?

The Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse will sit on December 14th to publicly mark the conclusion of the five-year long inquiry. Royal Commission CEO, Philip Reed, said the sitting will be a chance for Commissioners to thank the community for their continued support of the Royal Commission and its work. "When we began in 2013, we had no idea just how widespread or prevalent child sexual abuse in institutions was in Australia, or how many people would come forward to share their story," Mr Reed said. "Since then we have held 57 public hearings, where we sat for 444 days and heard evidence of more than 1,300 witnesses. Commissioners have also listened to the personal accounts of almost 8,000 survivors of child sexual abuse in institutions through 'private sessions'. "Combined with our comprehensive policy and research program, the Royal Commission has been able to contribute to the community's understanding and awareness of institutional child sexual abuse."

Two reports from the Royal Commission, one on the Ballarat Diocese and the other on the Catholic Church in Australia are expected to be released in the coming weeks before December 14th.

Following the initial gathering of parishioners with Sr Marg Carmody SGS to discern their membership on the Pastoral Council, those present agreed to continue this discernment process, seeking to clarify the role and purpose of the Pastoral Council and its relationship with existing parish groups, ministries and organisations.

Gospel Reflection: Sr Veronica Lawson rsm

"It has long been a common custom to give to Christ the metaphorical title of King." These are the words of Pope Pius XI who established this feast between two world wars in the hope of counteracting the growing secularism "in public affairs and politics" and finding a way towards global peace. Peace would never be achieved, wrote Pope Pius XI, until and unless individuals and nations accept the "rule of our Saviour". In some ways, hope for the global reign of the Prince of Peace seems more remote than ever. For many peace-loving people, the rise of the so-called Islamic State and of Boko Haram marked new low points in more than a century of violent and ongoing conflict which has claimed the lives of some 160 to 180 million people across the globe. From a Christian perspective, the world needs the sort of leadership that Jesus of Nazareth advocated in first century Palestine, the kind of leadership that Pope Francis is offering our world. The gospel for today provides a blueprint for Christian living in general and for leadership in particular. Matthew presents Jesus as both shepherd and sheep: as judge and king on the one hand and as suffering humanity ("the least") on the other. Works of mercy are the measure of justice or righteousness. Those who feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, and set the prisoners free are "the righteous/the sheep" who will inherit God's empire or kin-dom and have life. Those who fail in these respects are the unrighteous/the goats who fail to recognise the presence of the shepherd/king in the suffering of "the least". Why sheep and goats? While goats grazed with the sheep, they were never imaged as God's people, somewhat unfairly, I suggest. "Sheep", on the other hand, is a frequent biblical designation for the people of God's fold.

This gospel story is replete with mixed metaphors. It is the gospel source of the seven spiritual and corporal works of mercy that have informed the Christian way of life for centuries. It focusses on suffering humanity. In proclaiming an eighth work of mercy, care for our common home, Pope Francis has asked us to expand our horizons and to extend our concern to the suffering of the whole Earth community, human and other-than-human.

The Feast of Christ the King brings the church year to a close. It invites us to consider ways to achieve the things that make for peace. If we wish God's reign of peace to be realised on planet Earth, then we might heed the invitation of Pope Francis to care for our common home: to engage in "grateful contemplation of God's world" on the one hand and in daily gestures that "break with the logic of violence, exploitation and selfishness" on the other.
