

Preparing for Baptism

Clergy, Staff & Baptism Coordinators from the Parishes St. Columba's Ballarat North, Our Lady Help of Christians Wendouree, St. Alipius Ballarat East, St. Patrick's Cathedral, St. Aloysius Redan and St. James' Sebastopol have been meeting to discuss the centralisation of the Baptism preparation process. Commencing on the **Thursday 3rd August at 10.00 am & 7.00 pm** and monthly thereafter on the first Thursday of each month, all families wishing to have their children (under 7) baptised will be invited to attend these preparation sessions at St. Patrick's Cathedral. The celebrations of the sacrament of baptism will continue to include the first part of the Rite of Baptism being celebrated during a Sunday Mass with the Rite of Naming, Signing of the Cross and the Profession of Faith (the Creed) with the remainder of the Rite celebrated after Mass.

Partnership with St Vincent de Paul

The Cathedral Parish has recently entered into a partnership with the Society of St Vincent de Paul (North West Central Council) for the redevelopment of the downstairs rooms at the front of St Patrick's Cathedral Hall in Dawson St. The recently appointed community development worker Danielle Peters and Administrative services officer Emma Robertson will be based in one of the rooms while the other will be a room for professional development and ongoing learning. Redevelopment of this area will commence in August, costing approximately \$100,000. This partnership is in addition to the St Vincent de Paul Assistance Centre.

Euthanasia and Assisted Suicide Proposals

In April this year, the Catholic bishops of Victoria published a pastoral letter in response to proposals to introduce legislation allowing euthanasia and assisted suicide. As a follow-up to that letter, you are encouraged to write to parliamentarians to express your opposition to such legislation.

When Life Is Ending. Discussing Dying, Assisted Suicide and Euthanasia written by Dr Carol Ong is available to inform us. She writes that "Instead of providing the option to end life, we need to focus on the merits of end of life care and planning, and on making continuous improvements in these areas. There is much to be done to ensure that everyone in our community can die well."

How to defeat the proposed euthanasia bill

Euthanasia is when a doctor, not an illness, kills a patient but it not only kills the patient, it also kills good medical care and remember euthanasia is not part of palliative care. Palliative Care is merciful care for people approaching their death. Euthanasia is premeditated killing.

You are invited to act before legislation comes before the Parliament of Victoria in early August 2017.

- > Write a short letter to your MP stating your objection to the proposed legislation.
- > You could also phone your MP asking for an appointment to discuss the proposed legislation.

Some points you may like to make

- ➤ The Victorian Government should be spending its time tackling important issues like law and order, not pursuing radical social policies like euthanasia.
- Euthanasia turns doctors into life takers and patients into victims. It completely distorts the patient/doctor relationship and undermines the essential trust at the heart of the relationship.
- ➤ The Government used to stand for protecting society's most vulnerable, but now they are putting their very lives at risk.
- Assisted suicide sends a dangerous message that suicide is an acceptable response to suffering

World Day against Trafficking in Persons - July 30th

Human trafficking is a crime that exploits women, children and men for numerous purposes. The International Labour Organization estimates that 21 million people are victims of forced labour globally. Children make up almost a third of all human trafficking victims worldwide, according to the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime Global Report on Trafficking in Persons. Additionally, women and girls comprise 71 per cent of human trafficking victims. In 2010, the UN General Assembly adopted the Global Plan of Action to Combat Trafficking in Persons, urging Governments worldwide to take coordinated and consistent measures to defeat this scourge. The United Nations designated July 30th as the World Day against Trafficking in Persons, declaring that such a day was necessary to "raise awareness of the situation of victims of human trafficking and for the promotion and protection of their rights." Gospel Reflection by Sr Veronica Lawson RSM

Today's gospel passage begins and ends with reference to treasure. It invites us to pause and name what constitutes the real "treasure" in our lives, to know our own hearts. What do we really want? Many of our contemporaries are asking that question in relation to a consumerist life-style that appropriates far more than our share of the world's resources and leaves little time or energy for considering either the plight of our endangered planet or the needs and aspirations of those on the edge. There is a new realisation that standard of living and quality of life are far from synonymous.

Like Matthew's community, we need to be "scribes" trained for or educated in the ways of God. We need to bring out of the treasury of our traditions "what is new and what is old", wisely discerning what to keep and what to relinquish. Parables help to subvert our presuppositions, our ways of looking at the world. They disturb our complacency if we allow them to do so. The parables of the buried treasure and the pearl of great price remind us that gospel discipleship demands an all-embracing investment of heart and spirit. We don't have to re-invent the wheel. We simply need to search our hearts to know where our treasure lies and join with others who show us how we might claim it for the common good of the entire Earth community.
