LOCAL STUDENTS MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN CHILDREN'S LIVES

Last month students from Australian Catholic University (ACU) spent a weekend at Adekate Forest Lodge with more than forty children from the Ballarat region, as part of the biggest ever Aquinas Young Vinnies Kids Camp.
