FIRST READING from the prophet Jeremiah

In the days of Josiah, the word of the Lord was addressed to me, saying,

'Before I formed you in the womb I knew you; before you came to birth I consecrated you; I have appointed you as prophet to the nations. So now brace yourself for action. Stand up and tell them all I command you. Do not be dismayed at their presence, or in their presence I will make you dismayed. I, for my part, today will make you into a fortified city, a pillar of iron, and a wall of bronze to confront all this land: the kings of Judah, its princes, its priests and the country people. They will fight against you but shall not overcome you, for I am with you to deliver you – it is the Lord who speaks.'

RESPONSORIAL PSALM Ps 70:1-6, 15, 17. R. v.15

I will sing of your salvation.

In you, O Lord, I take refuge; let me never be put to shame. In your justice rescue me, free me: pay heed to me and save me.

Be a rock where I can take refuge, a mighty stronghold to save me; for you are my rock, my stronghold. Free me from the hand of the wicked.

It is you, O Lord, who are my hope, my trust, O Lord, since my youth. On you I have leaned from my birth, from my mother's womb you have been my help.

SECOND READING from the 1st letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

Be ambitious for the higher gifts. And I am going to show you a way that is better than any of them.

If I have all the eloquence of men or of angels, but speak without love, I am simply a gong booming or a cymbal clashing. If I have the gift of prophecy, understanding all the mysteries there are, and knowing everything, and if I have faith in all its fullness, to move mountains, but without love, then I am nothing at all. If I give away all that I possess, piece by piece, and if I even let them take my body to burn it, but am without love, it will do me no good whatever.

Love is always patient and kind; it is never jealous; love is never boastful or conceited; it is never rude or selfish; it does not take offence, and is not resentful. Love takes no pleasure in other people's sins but delights in the truth; it is always ready to excuse, to trust, to hope, and to endure whatever comes.

Love does not come to an end. But if there are gifts of prophecy, the time will come when they must fail; or the gift of languages, it will not continue for ever; and knowledge – for this, too, the time will come when it must fail. For our knowledge is imperfect and our prophesying is imperfect; but once perfection comes, all imperfect things will disappear. When I was a child, I used to talk like a child, and think like a child, and argue like a child, but now I am a man, all childish ways are put behind me. Now we are seeing a dim reflection in a mirror; but then we shall be seeing face to face. The knowledge that I have now is imperfect; but then I shall know as fully as I am known.

In short, there are three things that last: faith, hope and love; and the greatest of these is love.

'Rule breaking' Jesus is too much for mob to handle

Poor Jesus didn't have a chance! He broke all of the rules. When he began to preach he had just come in from a long fast in the desert looking like a starved animal. He addressed his own people and told them the truth about themselves. They answered "Who does this fellow think he is?" He challenged them to change their ways and to become responsible for themselves. So what did the people do? They eventually took him out and crucified him. But even in death Jesus did not keep the rules...When it comes to prayer, there are lots of methods and devotions that promise health and wealth and freedom from suffering in this life as well as everlasting happiness in the next. Are these feeding into our needs and promising us illusionary redemption? The story of Jesus is of a man whose prayer for an easy escape was not answered. "Would that this chalice could pass from me." It did not. It was through facing the reality of suffering that he came to Resurrection.

This is an extract from a reflection on the Gospel by Father Gerry Pierse, CSsR.

Misericordiae Vultus – The Face of Mercy

Pope Francis officially began the Jubilee Year of Mercy on December 8, 2015. It also was the Feast Day of the Immaculate Conception and coincided with the 50th anniversary of the closing of the Second Vatican Council. In par 4 of the Bull of Indiction (a letter to the Church, explaining the rationale for the special, year-long celebration), he explained why he chose this date:

"The Church feels a great need to keep this event alive...The walls which too long had made the Church a kind of fortress were torn down and the time had come to proclaim the Gospel in a new way...We recall the poignant words of St John XXIII when, opening the Council, he indicated the path to follow: 'Now the Bride of Christ wishes to use the medicine of mercy rather than taking up the arms of severity...' (Par 4)

Words of Wisdom

Speaking at the opening of a Holy Door in a homeless shelter before Christmas, Pope Francis said: "The way of salvation is not to be found through luxury, vanity, riches, or power."

We are all sinners, but God heals us with an abundance of grace, mercy and tenderness,

Paul Miki, a member of a noble Japanese family, was educated by Jesuits and joined the order as a scholastic in 1580.

However, the acting governor of Japan feared the influx and proliferation of Christian missionaries, as part of a conquest ploy by Spain and Portugal.

He had Paul and 25 of his companions taken to a hill overlooking Nagasaki Bay, bound to crosses and executed Feb. 6, 1597, in front of several thousand witnesses. The place was named Hill of the Martyrs and is marked with a stone cross and 26 trees.

The Church now celebrates the feast day of these martyrs on February 6.
