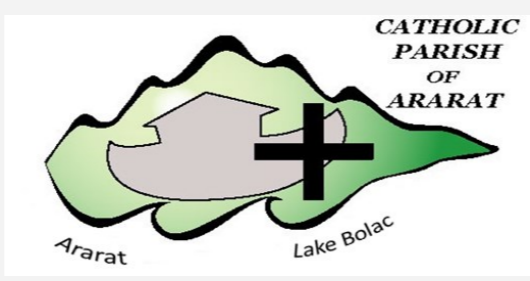
Prayer of Pope Francis for the Year of Mercy

Asylum Seekers

In light of the recent PNG decision regarding the legality of detention on Manus Island, one would imagine that Australia's leaders must be doing a lot of thinking and talking about the fate of asylum seekers. Here are three things that we can do.

- 1/ Pledge to Asylum Seekers – see back page
This Pledge has no political affiliations. It simply asks for the fair and just treatment of asylum seekers who come from desperate and vulnerable situations. It supports kindness and understanding, and it acknowledges that this is a two way street: that we have a responsibility to assist and support people seeking asylum in Australia, and that those who come here have a responsibility to respect our values and contribute to our diverse community. There is a rising groundswell of support to change the current hard line approach to asylum seekers, to find a better way that acknowledges people's basic human rights. What that way is, we don't personally know. But we hope that those who sign the Pledge will think deeply about how we can do this better, act in whatever way they feel they can to make a difference, and find the humanity that lives within us all. And share their stories here! If this resonates with you, please sign it and display it somewhere public. Follow the links to let the organisers know that you have signed and displayed the pledge. Note from Fr Andrew: sign it and display it on your fridge. Would be a good start and might start something interesting discussions with family and other visitors.

"Dear Prime Minister / Minister Dutton, local MP / Senator, etc
It's time now to abandon the failed policy of off-shoring Australia's responsibility for asylum seekers. The current arrangements shame us all. We must find our way back to a principled and decent approach, which protects the rights and dignity of people seeking our protection. The PNG Prime Minister has taken a stand for justice – now it is time for you to do likewise. It has never been clearer that the camps on Manus Island and Nauru must be closed immediately, and the people who have suffered there be brought here to Australia and treated with compassion and dignity. We can and must adopt an approach which gives asylum seekers a fair process to have their claims assessed while they live in our communities – other countries do this and we can too. It is just not good enough to pretend that we are acting in anyone's interest by maintaining this abusive, grubby and exorbitantly expensive regime of cruelty. Be brave, and take a stand for decency. Please do not further humiliate us all by looking for some other shabby deal with another poor neighbouring country."
