
GOSPEL REFLECTION

For many centuries the northern Syrian city of Aleppo pulsated with life. That life was fuelled by culture and commerce and pride in a long and colourful history. Five years of

civil war has more than decimated the population and virtually reduced the city to rubble. Amidst all the turmoil and danger, medical personnel from the international community risk their lives on a regular basis to cross the Turkish border and travel under cover of darkness to bring some measure of relief to a suffering people. Whether explicitly motivated by the Christian gospel or not, these people embody its spirit of self-giving for the sake of others.

On the long journey from Galilee through Samaritan territory to the city of Jerusalem, Jesus attracts a huge following and teaches relentlessly about the ways of God. By the time he reaches Jerusalem, the crowds have thinned considerably. Is this because it is too hard to persist with their initial impulse to follow the way of the gospel and the one who embodies its values? Implicit in Jesus' teaching about carrying one's cross is a reminder of the intense pain and sacrifice involved in being a disciple. It sometimes means going against what other family members want. It may even involve risking one's life for the sake of others. In the context of the Roman Empire, criminals who were sentenced to die by crucifixion carried to the place of execution the cross beam on which they would hang. The cross image is thus shocking for anyone. It is quite alienating for the faint hearted.

The term "hate" (*misein*) in this context seems harsh. The English translation fails to do justice, however, to the original Greek or the Hebrew that underlies this biblical notion. To "hate" in biblical terms is to "leave aside". Disciples are expected to love one another. There are times, however, when they have to "leave aside" the wishes of those they love most for the sake of a gospel call to justice, compassion, and right relationship. If we are attentive to the gender bias of this ancient text, we might note that married men are addressed while married women are not. Here as elsewhere, women have to read against the grain of the text in order to hear its message. Finally, there is a call in this gospel passage to "leave aside" unnecessary possessions. In a time of planetary vulnerability and of growing division between the privileged and the marginalised of the Earth community, the teaching of the Lukan Jesus has a particular resonance. There is no place in a gospel way of life for self-indulgence, for exploitation of others, or for self-centred appropriation of the goods of the earth.

The Canonisation of Mother Teresa of Calcutta on Sunday 4th September, 2016 10am at St Michaels the Archangel Church, Buronga.



We arrive this morning in Lucca. About 470kms to go. That's more or less from Ballarat to Mildura. The past week had seen some tough walks, a couple of 30kms. Last Saturday we walked 32kms on what was probably the toughest day's walk I have ever done on a Camino. The hot day didn't help. All morning up and down quite challenging hills through the Apennine Mountains. We will have a rest day here tomorrow. Lucca is a marvellous place. Full of history, culture, religious traditions and some beautiful architecture including Churches dating back to the earliest centuries of the Church's history. We have been coming into contact with more pilgrims the closer we get to Rome. However, the holiday season is finishing up so we may see less from now on. I am happy to meet others on the road, but having to share space in dormitories with them is another thing, especially if they snore!. We are set to walk through some more of the rolling hills of Tuscany once we leave Lucca. I trust all is well in the Parish.

NEWS FROM ST JOSEPH'S COLLEGE

HOW POPE FRANCIS AND MOTHER TERESA ARE LINKED.

Mother Teresa will be canonized on September 4 2016. This is a wonderful day and the whole world is overjoyed. Recently I read an article that I thought I would share with you. October day in 2012, Cardinal Jorge Bergoglio of Buenos Aires celebrated a traditional Mass for thousands of children in the Argentinean capital. A nun from Calcutta was on his mind. "Who told us that we can find Jesus in those most in need?" he asked the children gathered in the Parque Roca stadium. "Mother Teresa!" they replied. "And what did Mother Teresa have in her arms? A crucifix? No—a child in need," he taught them. "So we can find Jesus in each person who is in need." At the time, Bergoglio could never have imagined that in a few short years, he would make Mother Teresa a saint. Six months after he spoke to the children that day, the archbishop from Buenos Aires was anointed the Bishop of Rome. Now, as Pope Francis, he has named Mother Teresa for canonization, and she will forever be remembered as a Francis saint.

And yet Pope Francis could just as easily be called a Mother Teresa pope. Their mission fields were continents apart, but their lives have been woven together for years. Both served in religious orders, she as the founder of the Missionaries of Charity and he in the Society of Jesus. Both devoted themselves to the poor and drew attention to those whom society has cast to the margins—Teresa is known as a saint of the gutters and Francis as a pope of the slums. At their cores, they share a purpose in their public service and personal spirituality: to act as a channel of God's mercy. And as Francis ushers Teresa into sainthood, her mission will continue to define his papacy.


NEWS FROM OUR PRIMARY SCHOOL
