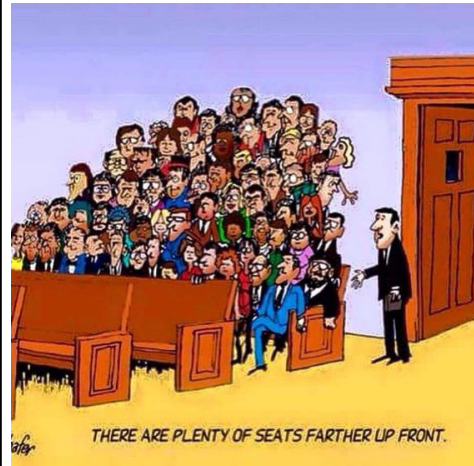

FRIGHTENING' RISE IN RELIGIOUS PERSECUTION

Religious persecution is getting worse globally, and assaults have become so frightening that the less terrifying incidents are going unnoticed, according to the latest US religious freedom report. Source: The Tablet.

“The state of affairs for international religious freedom is worsening in both the depth and breadth of violations,” according to the annual report of the US Commission on International Religious Freedom.

CHURCH COMMITS TO NATIONAL REDRESS SCHEME (ACBC)

Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and Catholic Religious Australia made the announcement yesterday in a joint statement.

“Since as early as 2013, the Catholic Church has called for a national redress scheme for survivors of child sexual abuse,” ACBC president Archbishop Mark Coleridge said.

“We support the royal commission’s recommendation for a national redress scheme, administered by the Commonwealth, and we are keen to participate in it.

“Survivors deserve justice and healing and many have bravely come forward to tell their stories.”

CRA president Sr Ruth Durick OSU said: “We recognise that redress will not take away a survivor’s pain, but hope that it can provide some practical assistance in the journey towards recovery from abuse.

“We are committed to providing redress to survivors who were abused within the Catholic Church.”

Various Catholic leaders told the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse that they supported a national redress scheme to limit future trauma for survivors of abuse in obtaining redress from the Church.

Given the diverse structure of the Church, Catholic officials have been working with the Commonwealth Government to enable the Church to work effectively with the independent National Redress Scheme Operator.

“To that end, we are establishing an agency to allow dioceses and religious congregations to interact with the Scheme Operator,” Archbishop Coleridge said.

Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull welcomed the church’s commitment as a “significant development”, the Herald Sun reports.

“The royal commission put the horrific experiences of survivors on the public record and now the redress scheme will continue the process of healing,” Mr Turnbull said.

“Every government and institution must take responsibility for the abuse that occurred on its watch, and pay the cost of providing redress.”

Western Australia is the only state yet to sign up to redress scheme but Mr Turnbull said the government was working “very constructively” to secure its involvement, along with other non-government institutions.

Legislation to establish the scheme passed the House of Representatives this week.

SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

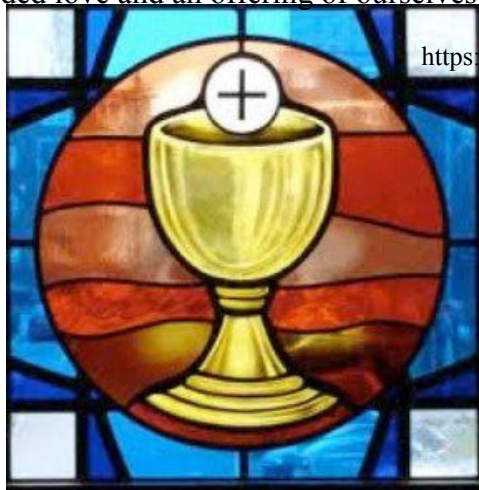

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ is also known as the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, which translates from Latin to "Body of Christ." This feast originated in France in the mid thirteenth century and was extended to the whole Church by Pope Urban IV in 1264. This feast is celebrated on the Thursday following the Trinity Sunday or, as in the USA, on the Sunday following that feast.

This feast calls us to focus on two manifestations of the Body of Christ, the Holy Eucharist and the Church. The primary purpose of this feast is to focus our attention on the Eucharist. The opening prayer at Mass calls our attention to Jesus' suffering and death and our worship of Him, especially in the Eucharist.

At every Mass our attention is called to the Eucharist and the Real Presence of Christ in it. The secondary focus of this feast is upon the Body of Christ as it is present in the Church. The Church is called the Body of Christ because of the intimate communion which Jesus shares with his disciples. He expresses this in the gospels by using the metaphor of a body in which He is the head. This image helps keep in focus both the unity and the diversity of the Church.

The Feast of Corpus Christi is commonly used as an opportunity for public Eucharistic processions, which serves as a sign of common faith and adoration. Our worship of Jesus in His Body and Blood calls us to offer to God our Father a pledge of undivided love and an offering of ourselves to the service of others.



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ening – attempted genocide, the slaughter of innocents, and wholesale destruction of places of worship – that less egregious abuses go unnoticed or at least unappreciated. Many observers have become numb to violations of the right to freedom of thought, conscience, and religion.”

Callista Gingrich, US Ambassador to the Holy See, tweeted: “The 2017 International Religious Freedom Report and the Ministerial to Advance Religious Freedom underscore America’s enduring commitment to religious freedom.”

Everyone has “a stake in this fight” for religious freedom, said the US ambassador at large for international religious freedom, Sam Brownback, told reporters at the launch of the report on Tuesday.

“One person’s bondage is another person’s burden to break,” he told reporters May 29. “We’re all people with beautiful and undeniable human dignity. Our lives are sacred. Our right to choose the road our conscience takes is inalienable.”

Among its findings, the report noted:

- The plight of the Rohingya and the Kachin people in Myanmar. Mr Brownback noted that he visited several of the refugee camps in Bangladesh about a month ago. “The situation is dire. We must do more to help them, as they continue to be targeted for their faith.”

- In North Korea, up to 120,000 political prisoners in “horrific conditions” in camps across the country, some have been imprisoned for religious reasons. The report said there were 1304 cases of alleged religious freedom violations in the country last year.

- In Eritrea, the government “reportedly killed, arrested, and tortured religious adherents and coerced individuals into renouncing their faith.”

- Tajikistan continues to prohibit minors from even participating in any religious activities.

The report also cited religious freedom violations in Saudi Arabia, Turkmenistan, China, Pakistan and Russia.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION:

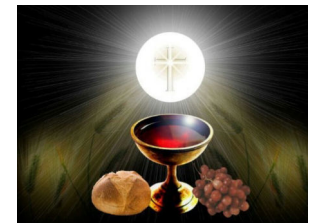
The readings, which reflect some aspect of the feast (Body & Blood of Christ), feature three prominent themes: the importance of blood in the ratification of the covenant; the atoning actions of Christ; the attitude of thanksgiving.

Most people today would probably be repelled by the ritual use of blood. Yet birth blood is not subject to the same revulsion, nor is blood transfusion frowned upon. Blood is recognised as a life force, and blood relationships are cherished. In a sense this ritual makes us blood sisters and brothers of God and of each other. It seals our fate and it entitles us to the family inheritance.

This feast celebrates the incomparable love of Christ. He offered himself for the expiation of our sins; he spread a banquet table for us at which we are able to eat the bread of companionship and share the blood of the new covenant.

How shall we make a return to the Lord for all the good that we have received? The only appropriate response to God’s graciousness is thanksgiving (eucharistía). We have been chosen; we have been delivered; we have a witness in heaven; and now we have been given the bread of eternal life and the blood of salvation. What return can we give? A life of gratitude lived in the presence of God; a life of union with all those who eat the same bread and drink from the same cup; a life of faithful expectation, waiting for the coming of the reign of God in all its fullness.
