Dear Friends,  
In today's gospel we see that Jesus gives very high praise of John, "among those born of women", even as he describes the prophet as the man who is to prepare the way for the Lord. Here we note that John is so highly praised by Jesus, who has sent messengers to ask Jesus, "Are you the one who is to come or should we look for another?" In other words, John is undergoing a crisis of faith. Jesus replies by pointing to his saving works, thus reassuring John and asking his messengers to report this back to him.

God allows even his most favoured and most faithful followers to undergo crises in life. The doubts that assail us and the difficulties that test our faith are part of our growing in maturity as believers. Next Sunday's gospel will describe the crisis that Joseph undergoes when he finds out that Mary, his beloved wife, with whom he has not yet lived, is pregnant. He had decided to divorce her before God steps in with the message that the child in Mary's womb is from the Holy Spirit.

So don't be anxious when a crisis confronts you. A crisis is both a danger and an opportunity. While a crisis can make us fall, it can also make us soar. When you are undergoing a crisis, don't keep that crisis to yourself. Talk to a friend or friends or a counsellor. But above all, talk to God. Trust that God will see you through. In our celebration let us ask the Lord to give us the simplicity of faith or child-like faith to put all our worries and crises in God and to walk humbly with God in our daily life.

## **Plenary Council 2020: National Theme for Discernment December: Prayerful and Eucharistic:**

How is God calling us to be a Christ-centred Church that is Prayerful and Eucharistic? This National Theme for Discernment is inspired by the voices of the People of God who expressed a deep and faith-filled trust in God and a need for lament and healing within the Church, acknowledging the sexual abuse crisis as a turning point for the Church in Australia.

“What does it mean to live a true Christian life?”

“How can we encourage all Catholics to be open to the Spirit working in people in different ways, through different forms of liturgy (traditional and charismatic), different types of worship and different faith responses to the Spirit in individuals and communities?”

“How do we get people to return to prayer when we live in such a fast-paced life?”

“Can lay-led liturgy be made to resemble the Mass more closely in regards to the prayers that are not part of lay-led liturgy but are part of the Mass?”

“How do all the faithful called to prayer and a living relationship with Jesus Christ learn about their faith through the Sacraments, catechesis, ongoing education and following the traditions of the Church in a multicultural society which has become very secular?”

### **Clinical Pastoral Education 2020**

An opportunity to participate in a part-time Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) program will be available February 13 to June 25, 2020. This program is recognised by the University of Divinity if one is enrolled in theological studies. The program requires 10 hours of pastoral practice and one education day per week. Placements for supervised pastoral experience are available at South West Health Care Medical Ward and Community Palliative Care, Warrnambool Hospice Care and St Joseph's Catholic Parish Warrnambool. A reading from the prophet Isaiah

## **Gospel Reading:** [Mt 11:2-11](#)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

*Are you the one who is to come, or must we wait for someone else?*

John in his prison had heard what Christ was doing and he sent his disciples to ask him, 'Are you the one who is to come, or have we got to wait for someone else?' Jesus answered, 'Go back and tell John what you hear and see; the blind see again, and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised to life and the Good News is proclaimed to the poor; and happy is the man who does not lose faith in me.'

As the messengers were leaving, Jesus began to talk to the people about John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed swaying in the breeze? No? Then what did you go out to see? A man wearing fine clothes? Oh no, those who wear fine clothes are to be found in palaces. Then what did you go out for? To see a prophet? Yes, I tell you, and much more than a prophet: he is the one of whom scripture says: Look, I am going to send my messenger before you; he will prepare your way before you. I tell you solemnly, of all the children born of women, a greater than John the Baptist has never been seen; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he is.'

**REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate *The Right Question***

John was languishing in prison, held captive by the local agent of the Roman Empire. Perhaps he was looking for evidence that Jesus was the One who would throw off Roman despotism. In answer to his questing, Jesus replied that John should rather look at what was happening on the ground in His healing ministry and orientation to the poor. *Those* are the signs that the reign of God has begun. I admire John the Baptist because he was prepared to seek and accept the answer to the question which was crucial to him, even though the answer might upset his preconceptions. He was a true seeker after Truth.

All our activities as a parish in building community, forming faith, serving the poor, participating in the liturgy, should be undertaken so that a seeker after Truth might see and hear the evidence of the presence and mission of the risen Lord Jesus Christ amongst us.

We could pause for a moment to simply pray in the spirit of Advent: 'Come, Lord Jesus' to satisfy the restlessness of the questing heart.
