LET US BE UNITED IN PRAYER: 5TH. SUNDAY OF LENT 2020

Individual/ Family Prayer: Introduction – ‘Your brother will rise again,’ said Jesus, ‘the resurrection and the life’ (John 11:25), to Martha (John 11:24) ‘The glory of God is a human being fully alive,’ said St Irenaeus
Lord Jesus, you bring pardon and peace to the sinner: Lord, have mercy ...

Lord Jesus, you intercede for us with your Father: Christ, have mercy ...

Lord Jesus you raise the dead to new life, through your gift of the Holy Spirit: Lord, have mercy ...

Let us pray (for the courage to embrace the world with Jesus)

Father, the love of your Son led him to accept the suffering of the cross, so that his sisters and brothers might rise to new ways of living. Change our selfishness into self-giving. Help us to embrace the human race with his generous love, and through the power of his life, death, and resurrection, to transform its darkness and pain into light and joy. We make our prayer through Christ our Lord. AMEN.

Gospel Reading; John 11: 1–45 On arriving, Jesus found that Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days. When Martha heard that Jesus had come, she went to meet him. Mary remained sitting in the house. Martha said to Jesus, ‘If you had been here, my brother would not have died, but I know that, even now, whatever you ask of God, he will grant you.’ ‘Your brother,’ said Jesus to her, ‘will rise again.’ Martha said, ‘I know he will rise again at the resurrection on the last day.’ Jesus said, ‘I am the resurrection. If anyone believes in me, even though he dies he will live, and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?’ ‘Yes, Lord,’ she said, ‘I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who has come into this world.’ Jesus said in great distress, with a sigh that came straight from the heart, ‘Where have you put him?’ They said, ‘Lord, come and see.’ Jesus wept; and the Jews said, ‘See how much he loved him!’ Still sighing, Jesus reached the tomb: it was a cave with a stone to close the opening. Jesus said, ‘Take the stone away.’ Martha said to him, ‘Lord, by now he will smell; this is the fourth day.’ Jesus replied, ‘Have I not told you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?’ So they took away the stone. Then Jesus lifted up his eyes and said, ‘Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer. I know indeed that you always hear me, but I speak for the sake of all these who stand round me, so that they may believe it was you who sent me.’ Then he cried out in a loud voice, ‘Lazarus, here! Come out!’ The dead man came out, his feet and hands bound with bands of stuff and a cloth round his face. Jesus said to them, ‘Unbind him, let him go free.’

Questions for Reflection: Are you surprised that Jesus wept at the death of his friend? Why/why not? Identify some experiences that are destructive of people, other than physical death. How can you and I help others to recover from such experiences?

Gospel Reflection:

Sunday’s readings touch into the most profound of mysteries, the mysteries of life and death. The news this morning (March 23) tells us that 14,641 people have died from Coronavirus over the past two months. With this pandemic comes an extraordinary outpouring of grief and fear. Death brings tears, even anger. Little wonder that “life” becomes a metaphor for transformation and new beginnings or that “death” so often signifies deprivation and loss.

The Gospel reading is about the death and restoration to life of Lazarus, “the one whom Jesus loved.” The story revolves around the plight of Lazarus, the sick “brother” of Martha and Mary. Might they all be part of a little faith community in Bethany rather than biological siblings? Right now, in the face of a pandemic, we are called, as sisters and brothers across the globe, to play our part so that this illness may lead to greater love and even to “life”.
