

Dear Friends, In today's gospel we see that Jesus tells Nicodemus, a member of the Jewish council (the Sanhedrin) that the Spirit of God is like a wind that blows where it will; it can be felt and heard but no one can picture what it really is or predict the direction of its movement. In the scripture, the Spirit is described in a variety of ways, each concept presenting something of the Spirit but never truly capturing it. The Spirit may be compared to a diamond that has many sides and angles, each side presents something of the beauty of the diamond, but only partly. The liturgy offers us a wealth of scriptural readings to enable us to wonder and be awed by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. In the first reading, Luke pictures the Spirit descending upon the disciples gathered in the upper room like a strong wind and resting upon them in tongues as of fire. Wind and fire are powerful natural elements and they fittingly symbolize the divine action that changes and empowers the disciples to proclaim boldly that Jesus is the Messiah whom God raised from the dead. The gospel, on the other hand, has the risen Jesus breathing on the disciples giving them the Holy Spirit. The action is less perceptible, but the effect is tremendous, that the disciples are empowered to forgive sins and renewing people in the depth of their being. In our celebration let us ask the Lord to empower and strengthen us by the power of the Holy Spirit, so that we may be able to live as messengers of Jesus in our day-to-day life.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading: Acts 2:1-11

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak different languages.

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose.

Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink.

May 27, 2020

Hello Everyone,

From next Monday (June 1), Victorian government restrictions on gatherings will be eased. The change will apply to the numbers of people permitted to gather at places of worship and the numbers permitted at ceremonies.

From Monday June 1:

Places of worship can open for private worship or small religious ceremonies for up to 20 people in a single undivided indoor space, subject to the four square metre rule plus the minimum number of people reasonably required to perform the service or ceremony.

20 people in addition to the celebrant and couple being married can attend a wedding. If a wedding is held in a home, a maximum of 20 people is allowed, including the celebrant and the couple.

50 people can attend a funeral in addition to the celebrant and funeral staff, subject to the four square metre rule. If a funeral is held in a home, a maximum of 20 people can be present, including the celebrant and funeral staff.

Please note that the current provisions about distance between people, signage, hygiene and cleaning, as well as keeping a record of attendees, will still be in force.

In all cases, the following requirements will still apply:

- Distancing of at least 1.5m between attendees
- Signage at the church door specifying the maximum number permitted at any time, allowing 4 square metres/person
- A register of attendees, including name, phone number, date & time of attendance
- A reasonable time between events to allow for cleaning between each service
- Cleaning by wiping with disinfectant:
- Frequently touched surfaces (at least twice/day)
- Whenever a surface is visibly soiled

I thank all our local communities for your ongoing care for one another.

Best wishes as you arrange gatherings within the new limits.
