Message from Fr James

Thanks once more to everyone for your patience and understanding around our limitations on numbers at Sunday Mass. We are now seeing in the news that there is certainly reason for us to keep vigilant, but I am still confident it won't be too long before restrictions will be eased once more. Let's continue to keep our leaders and those on the front line in our prayers.

Every day in history has its challenges, and it shouldn't surprise us that ours are no exception. We really do have to fall back on our trust in God and his promises. We have to rely on faith and hope. We celebrated the Feast of St Thomas the Apostle on Friday. Poor Thomas often gets a bit of a bad rap for at first failing to believe that Jesus had indeed risen and come back from the dead. That episode in John's Gospel is of course where the phrase 'doubting Thomas' comes from. But let's not be too harsh on ol' Tom. Sure, he stumbled, but once he had for himself seen the risen Christ, he also had the faith to recognise his true nature as both God and man. Furthermore, his little stumble became the occasion for Jesus to strengthen us on our own journey with the words 'Blessed are they who have not seen, and yet believe.' It is almost like a full stop to the Beatitudes in Matthew and Luke. We cannot always see where God might be leading us, nor can we always recognise easily his abiding presence among us. But faith leads us on. It can be encouraging to let Jesus' words speak directly to us, 'Blessed are *you*, who have not seen, and yet believe.'

Just one update on a bit of parish news. We have heard back from our insurance assessor and repair works to St Michael's Church in Lalbert will commence soon. Hopefully it won't be too long therefore until we can open it again for use.

More from "St Mary's Parish Swan Hill, 1893-1993"

Quite a few appreciated last week's exert from the Swan Hill Parish History. I thought then I might share this further passage, "The Church is the people". This understanding has been especially important in these last few months. When we can't gather physically as a parish, it certainly pushes our focus back on each of our homes being a little domestic Church.

The Church is the people and certainly no account of the development of Catholic life in the Mallee, or anywhere else, could be attempted without telling of the faith, loyalty, perseverance and hard work of the early Catholic settlers, their wives, children and even grandchildren in supporting their priests, and, later, nuns- offering their homes for refreshment and rest in the horse and buggy days, lending fresh horses to priests going farther to celebrate more Masses, gathering any neighbours within travelling distance for Mass in their homes, giving what money they could, in good seasons and bad, to build churches, schools and presbyteries as need and opportunity arose.

At the same time, the children were taught about their faith and the Commandments, at home, and the family Rosary was a daily feature of practically every household and played a big part in the strengthening that faith and engendering a love of Mary, the Mother of Jesus, in the children.

Gospel Reflection by Greg Sunter

When we hear the term, *yoke*, we tend to think about the yoke that is used to harness oxen together or the yoke that someone might carry on their shoulder to balance a heavy load. This yoke across the shoulder was adopted into tailoring and so the shoulder piece set into a shirt is also called a yoke. However, in the Jewish tradition there is a completely different meaning to the term. The yoke of a rabbi was his particular interpretation of Torah (the Law); his particular teaching. Disciples who followed a particular rabbi sought to take on his yoke; his particular interpretation. The yoke of any rabbi was best identified by asking him, 'Which is the greatest commandment?' A rabbi's answer to this question revealed his interpretation of Torah. When Jesus is asked that question, he answers, 'Love God and love your neighbour,' and goes on to say that all of the rest of the Law and the prophets flows on from these two commandments. This is the yoke – the interpretation of Torah – that Jesus taught.

In today's gospel, Jesus calls to him all those who labour and are overburdened. It is the Pharisaic interpretation of the Law that burdens these people. Trying to maintain the Law was burdensome and complicated for the everyday person. Jesus says, 'Shoulder *my* yoke and learn from me ... my yoke is easy.' The yoke of Jesus was easy: Love God and love your neighbour. Compared to the 613 *mitzvot* (commands) set out in the Torah and strictly maintained by the Pharisees, the yoke of Jesus was incredibly easy to understand and adopt. So simple, in fact, that it required a child-like simplicity to accept this yoke
