For God's Sake, Wear a Mask

I am writing this bulletin piece on Thursday evening. Parishioners will have seen the new requirements coming in from midnight Sunday. It is clear that the Victorian government and health experts are concerned and are calling for a higher level of vigilance at this time. As parish priest I believe my role is to support the message. **WEAR YOUR MASKS WHEN YOU LEAVE YOUR HOUSE! AND WASH YOUR HANDS! AND SOCIAL DISTANCE.** In the Northern Territory children have been told to keep a kangaroo's distance apart. Whatever works for you. Shopping trolley, kangaroo ... just distance, mask up and wash your hands! Let's keep one another well and healthy. We'll not have cuppas after Mass until further notice. From Sunday night we'll be required to wear masks at Mass. We can remove them if we're the reader and to receive communion.

OTHER Covid 19 Arrangements

For all public liturgy we will require names and numbers and sanitising of hands, seats and door knobs.

Gospel

Mt 14:13-21

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

They all ate and were satisfied.

When Jesus received the news of John the Baptist's death he
withdrew by boat to a lonely place where they could be by
themselves. But the people heard of this and, leaving the towns,
went after him on foot. So as he stepped ashore he saw a large
crowd; and he took pity on them and healed their sick.

When evening came, the disciples went to him and said, 'This is a
lonely place, and the time has slipped by; so send the people
away, and they can go to the villages to buy themselves some
food.' Jesus replied, 'There is no need for them to go: give them
something to eat yourselves.' But they answered, 'All we have with
us is five loaves and two fish.' 'Bring them here to me,' he said. He
gave orders that the people were to sit down on the grass; then he
took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven and
said the blessing. And breaking the loaves he handed them to his
disciples who gave them to the crowds. They all ate as much as
they wanted, and they collected the scraps remaining, twelve
baskets full. Those who ate numbered about five thousand men, to
say nothing of women and children.

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

Although divine power is manifested in dramatic ways, it is also
present in what is unassuming. Traces of God can be seen in the
delicacy of a violet, in a cool summer breeze, in the blush of
innocence, in the fiery eyes of justice. Every one of us lives in the
midst of God, breathes the breath of God's life, and is constantly
touched by the exquisite artistry of God's creativity. Life itself is a
mountain experience of God.

As wonderful as life may be, it can also be very frightening at times.
There are misunderstandings and rancour, jealousy and
vindictiveness, greed and a hunger for power. Our personal lives
can come unravelled and we can feel that we are genuinely 'at
sea'. Every human being is tossed about by the exigencies of life. It
is at times like these that we need faith in Jesus. Even though we
do not recognise him, he is there in the midst of our chaos. Having
the power of God, he is the definitive champion of all chaos, and so
he is able to allay our fears and calm the sea.

A true experience of God, whether it be within the ordinariness of
life or one of life's tribulations, is both transformative and effusive. It
is a reality that cannot be contained; it must be proclaimed.
Disciples must be ready to do what they can in order that the good
news of God's revelation be made known to others.
