Making Connections: Once again we see Jesus withdrawing alone to pray. The example of Jesus in quiet prayers can be a pointer to us in how to pray. As a Church we pray communally, but quiet reflection is also important. Take time this week to reflect alone. The disciples cry to Jesus in their distress, 'Lord, save me'. This week, allow yourself to hear Jesus' answer: 'Courage! Do not be afraid.'

Did you Know?: In art, the Church is often represented as a boat. A boat carries its passengers through threatening waters but is not exempt from the turbulence of storms. The Church can bear through the storms of life but it does not exempt us from stresses and struggles.

Daily Prayer: Strengthen our "little faith," and open our eyes to your presence at every moment of history and in every circumstance of life, that we may face with serenity times of testing, turmoil, and ISOLATION, to walk with Christ through storms toward safe haven and true peace

A Vocation View: Why is it that we lack real trust when the Lord calls us? We think we may drown, or have to give up too much, or fear failure. These attitudes can help to strengthen our faith in the Lord.

Gloria: Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father. Lord Jesus Christ, Only Begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

Intercessions: My sisters and brothers, as our world is tossed about as in a storm through the COVID-19 Pandemic, other natural disasters and wars, we take heart from Jesus's words: *Courage! It is !! Do not be afraid!* That Pope Francis, through his calm and encouraging words, will bring to the Church and to the world, in this time of the Covid 19 pandemic, the comfort of Jesus and so restore hope to every apprehensive heart.

That as we mark the 75th anniversary of the destruction of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in Japan, may world leaders work together to end the making and stockpiling of nuclear weapons so that peace has a chance.

That every person in Australia will follow the advice of our health leaders during this COVID-19 pandemic and not be a danger to themselves or to others, praying especially for the people of Melbourne and Victoria.

That on this International Day of the World's Indigenous people, we will respect our own First Nation People, and that across the globe all indigenous people will have the opportunity to grow spiritually, have their rights respected, and their human needs met.

That following the Solemnity of St Mary of the Cross, all Australians will be encouraged by her trust in the providence of God and her extraordinary commitment to the poor; and on the eve of St Lawrence's day, may we all be committed to the word of God and to charity.

That those injured in the massive explosion in Beirut in Lebanon will receive assistance, those killed be given eternal rest and their families be comforted.

For those who have died, and anniversaries occurring at this time, Ann Downs, Margaret Niehus, Maria Murphy, Ramon Schaefer, and our own departed loved ones.

Celeb: Almighty God, as the prophet Isaiah entered your presence as if enfolded in a gentle breeze, so come to us in the silence of our heart-felt prayer.

The Word. We hear about Elijah in the First Reading. It comes at key moments in Elijah's ministry. He is feeling dejected and alone. He feels his faithfulness to God has gone unrewarded, or stronger still, that it has caused him great trouble and anguish. God reaches out to Elijah in the midst of his frustration and sorrow. That's not to say that God had ever been absent. He was with Elijah every step of the way. But now he shows himself so that Elijah might be strengthened. And notice how he does so, in a small loaf of bread and a gentle breeze. It is our faith that God remains present to us too through these difficult times. It is no point however waiting for claps of thunder or lightning. Instead, recognise God's loving care for us in the simple things; the food on our table and the air that we breathe.

First Reading: 1 Kings 19:9, 11-13

When Elijah reached Horeb, the mountain of God, he went into the cave and spent the night in it. Then he was told, 'Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord.' Then the Lord himself went by. There came a mighty wind, so strong it tore the mountains and shattered the rocks before the Lord. But the Lord was not in the wind. After the wind came an earthquake. But the Lord was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake came a fire. But the Lord was not in the fire. And after the fire there came the sound of a gentle breeze. And when Elijah heard this, he covered his face with his cloak and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave.

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 84:9-14

Lord, show us your mercy and love, and grant us your salvation.

I will hear what the Lord God has to say, a voice that speaks of peace. His help is near for those who fear him and his glory will dwell in our land.

Mercy and faithfulness have met; justice and peace have embraced. Faithfulness shall spring from the earth and justice look down from heaven.

The Lord will make us prosper and our earth shall yield its fruit. Justice shall march before him and peace shall follow his steps.

Second Reading: Romans 9:1-5

What I want to say is no pretence; I say it in union with Christ - it is the truth - my conscience in union with the Holy Spirit assures me of it too. What I want to say is this: my sorrow is so great, my mental anguish so endless, I would willingly be

condemned and be cut off from Christ if it could help my brothers of Israel, my own flesh and blood. They were adopted as sons, they were given the glory and the covenants; the Law and the ritual were drawn up for them, and the promises were made to them. They are descended from the patriarchs and from their flesh and blood came Christ who is above all, God for ever blessed! Amen.

Gospel Acclamation: Ps 129:5

Alleluia, alleluia! I hope in the Lord, I trust in his word. Alleluia!

Gospel: Matthew 14:22-33

Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side while he would send the crowds away. After sending the crowds away he went up into the hills by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, while the boat, by now far out on the lake, was battling with a heavy sea, for there was a head-wind. In the fourth watch of the night he went towards them, walking on the lake, and when the disciples saw him walking on the lake they were terrified. 'It is a ghost' they said, and cried out in fear. But at once Jesus called out to them, saying 'Courage! It is I! Do not be afraid.' It was Peter who answered. 'Lord', he said 'if it is you, tell me to come to you across the water.' 'Come' said Jesus. Then Peter got out of the boat and started walking towards Jesus across the water, but as soon as he felt the force of the wind, he took fright and began to sink. 'Lord! Save me!' he cried. Jesus put out his hand at once and held him. 'Man of little faith,' he said 'why did you doubt?' And as they got into the boat the wind dropped. The men in the boat bowed down before him and said, 'Truly, you are the Son of God.'

Gospel Reflection: SunAOrd19 Veronica Lawson rsm:

Right now, our planet is battered by the waves of pandemic. Our church also knows what it means to be "battered by the waves". Over its two millennia history, there have been periods of discrimination and persecution against its members. Countless church members have died for their faith, while others have been and are being denied the freedom to practice their religion. There have also been times when the church has fallen far short of its own ideals and has quite seriously betrayed the gospel values it seeks to embody and proclaim. It is presently "battered" by huge even terrifying waves, largely of its own creating. Only God can bring order out of the chaos, and God works through the courageous witness and action of faith-filled disciples. In today's gospel, Matthew tells of Jesus astride the waves like the God of Israel in Job 9:8. In Israel's mythology, the sea represents chaos. To walk on water is to have power and authority to bring order out of the chaos. Matthew presents Jesus as exercising the power of God over the potentially destructive chaos. Jesus makes his claim to divine power explicit in words that echo God's words from the burning bush: "It is I" (literally "I am"). He tells the frightened disciples to take heart and not to be afraid. Peter, leader of the group,

continues to doubt. He asks for a sign and is then prepared to take a risk in order to come to Jesus on the water. He begins to falter when he takes his eyes off Jesus and focuses instead on the threatening wind. Jesus reaches out his hand to rescue Peter. In a lovely gesture, Jesus takes him by the hand and holds him firmly in his grip. Jesus names Peter's hesitation as a response of limited faith. Matthew weaves the story of Peter into an earlier story from Mark's gospel. We can only speculate on the reasons for this. Were Matthew's communities going through hard times? Were they battered by the waves of conflicting loyalties as they found themselves excluded from Pharisaic Judaism? Was the pressure of separation from the synagogue too great for some, even for those in leadership? This is a telling story for anyone who exercises leadership at any level in the church. It is a reminder to us as disciples to keep our eyes firmly fixed on the source of hope in times of struggle and uncertainty and on the crucial issues that face our planetary home. Today's Gospel asks us to consider the threatening waves created by the undeniable reality of the pandemic. The community is largely responsible for the climate crisis, and must join hands to save what can be saved. The commitment to renewable energy is an image of reaching out to communities in need.

Next Week's Gospel: Matthew 15:21-28

Jesus left Gennesaret and withdrew to the region of Tyre and Sidon. Then out came a Canaanite woman from that district and started shouting, 'Sir, Son of David, take pity on me. My daughter is tormented by a devil.' But he answered her not a word. And his disciples went and pleaded with him. 'Give her what she wants,' they said 'because she is shouting after us.' He said in reply, 'I was sent only to the lost sheep of the House of Israel.' But the woman had come up and was kneeling at his feet. 'Lord,' she said 'help me.' He replied, 'It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the house-dogs.' She retorted, 'Ah yes, sir; but even house-dogs can eat the scraps that fall from their master's table.' Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, you have great faith. Let your wish be granted.' And from that moment her daughter was well again.
