The meeting began with a time of prayer and reflection. As it was World Earth Day the focus of the prayer and reflection was on environmental issues and how the changing climate and commercial concerns are impacting on the Diocese in areas of water, earth pollution and climate change. The Commission brainstormed how we can promote active response within the Diocese.

With a national election coming up, Rachel has put on the web site the Australian Bishops' Statement and the responses the different political parties have made in regard to social justice issues. The Commission looked at the CEO policies and were pleased to see how these promoted Catholic Church Social Outreach and the process of SEE, JUDGE, ACT.
