Dear Friends,

The Jewish people had a great respect and reverence for the book of Torah (Scriptures). This book contains their laws: they are religious laws, cultural laws, purification laws, liturgical laws, social laws and civil laws - so there are many commandments. In today's gospel Jesus engages in teaching about the "Commandment of Love". The religious leaders, particularly Pharisees, were confused and asked Jesus: 'Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest', because Jesus has reduced their laws into one commandment, however with two parts.

Here Jesus is answering their question about the greatest commandment and telling them that the whole law (in the book of Torah) and the prophets depend on these commandments: the commandment of love of God and of our neighbour. Jesus makes the love of neighbour part and parcel of the commandment of love. Our love for God does not bring us into an exclusive relationship, but rather it diffuses, spreads and brings others into the circle of love. We show our love for God by loving our fellow human beings as we love ourselves. So therefore love of God complements love of neighbour. Both are inseparable and qualify each other - there is no conflict between the two. Jesus not only preached but also demonstrated this way of life. So let us follow the example of Jesus in our day-to-day life. - Neville.

Message from Vicar General

The following is the most recent update COVID 19 restrictions:

Ceremonies and religious gatherings

- Indoor Religious ceremonies: not allowed; 5 people can attend a place of worship to conduct a ceremony being broadcast
- Private worship: allowed for households, plus a faith leader
- Outdoor religious gatherings and ceremonies: up to 20 people, plus 1 faith leader, proximate to a place of worship
- Weddings: up to 10 people (including couple and two witnesses), celebrant excluded from cap
- Funerals: up to 20 people, infants under 12 months and people to conduct funeral not included in cap. If weddings or funerals are held at private residence, private gathering restrictions apply
- Places of worship (including the conducting of ceremonies): subject to existing workplace requirements, including but not limited to record keeping, cleaning requirements, and having a COVIDSafe plan in place

FROM 11.59PM, 1 NOVEMBER:

- Outdoor religious gatherings and ceremonies: up to 50 people, plus 1 faith leader, proximate to a place of worship

Please remember that we are not beyond the law and the requisites of canon law for celebrating Mass.

First Reading: Ex 22:20-26

A reading from the book of Exodus

If you are harsh with the widow or the orphan, my anger will rage against you.

The Lord said to Moses, “Tell the sons of Israel this, “You must not molest the stranger or oppress him, for you lived as strangers in the land of Egypt. You must not be harsh with the widow, or with the orphan; if you are harsh with them, they will surely cry out to me, and be sure I shall hear their cry; my anger will flare and I shall kill you with the sword, your own wives will be widows, your own children orphans.

“If you lend money to any of my people, to any poor man among you, you must not play the usurer with him: you must not demand interest from him.

“If you take another's cloak as a pledge, you must give it back to him before sunset. It is all the covering he has; it is the cloak he wraps his body in; what else would he sleep in? If he cries to me, I will listen, for I am full of pity.”

Second Reading: 1 Thes 1:5-10

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians

You turned away from idols to serve God and await his Son.

You observed the sort of life we lived when we were with you, which was for your instruction, and you were led to become imitators of us, and of the Lord; and it was with the joy of the Holy Spirit that you took to the gospel, in spite of the great opposition all round you. This has made you the great example to all believers in Macedonia and Achaia since it was from you that the word of the Lord started to spread – and not only throughout Macedonia and Achaia, for the news of your faith in God has spread everywhere. We do not need to tell other people about it: other people tell us how we started the work among you, how you broke with idolatry when you were converted to God and became servants of the real, living God; and how you are now waiting for Jesus, his Son, whom he raised from the dead, to come from heaven to save us from the retribution which is coming.

Gospel Reading: Mt 22:34-40

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

You shall love the Lord your God and your neighbour as yourself.

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees they got together and, to disconcert him, one of them put a question, 'Master, which is the greatest commandment of the law?' Jesus said, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: you must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also.'

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

Did you notice that Our Lord does not command us to love 'God'? No, we are to love 'the *Lord* your God', the One who rescued the Jewish people from slavery. The resurrection of Jesus Christ reveals the Lord God as the liberator from the apparent final dominance of death. Loving such a liberator is the natural response. So, 'Love *the Lord* your God'.

Then Our Lord does not command us to love our neighbour! Rather, 'Love your neighbour as *yourself*.' But who is 'yourself'? In the wonderful story-telling of Genesis, we are told that Adam, an earthen statue, had Divine Breath breathed into the nostrils, creating him as a human being. We earthlings are conceived with the Divine Breath at the core of our being.

The challenge for you and for me is to see 'yourself' in that way, and thereafter every human being whose lives we can affect: the neighbour. And in today's global world, the neighbour can be a person in a society geographically or culturally distant.

We could pause for a moment to see the true dimensions of God, self and the other, to more easily fulfil the dual command.
