### From the Parish Team

This week's Gospel gives us another image of the Kingdom. We have an outrageously generous God who lavishes us with gifts and only asks we use them to spread this spirit in the community. The spirit is evident of those returning to Masses, albeit the small numbers. There is also the generous spirit exuding from our Parish Kitchen and the shared spreading to the needy and isolated in our town. We have had special times catching up with friends over a cuppa or luncheon. Let's keep us this generous spirit! Working together generates energy and ideas.

### Nothing is too big for us when we work together.

We would like to thank our team of volunteers who tirelessly met every Friday, with their list of parishioners to drop off to or visit over a fence/through a screen door. Some barriers went up because of Covid, and some came down. We swapped recipes, bagged up biscuits and wanted to keep in touch.

In two weeks time, the Covid rules for Mass will change again from November 23rd. We will be allowed to have 50 people in our church with the required space between us. The pews will have markings on them. The small pews can seat two people, the large one –3. This is indeed great news. But it has us suddenly going from 10kms per hour to 80!

### The plan is the following:

Mass 8.30am in Ararat in the Church. We can fit **50** people with the 4sq metre spacing rule.

- Please come **10 minutes early** so you can sign the Mass Attendance sheet for Covid regulations. Unless you are a visitor, we will no longer need your telephone number. We have that on file now

Not sure what will happen for Christmas, but we may have further changes by then.

### Cont'd

Everyone is welcome for weekday Mass with the lunch. We just won't be making Beef Wellington for 50!

Now, we need to think about rejigging the Cleaning Roster and creating a Hospitality Roster. So many positive things have been created during Covid and we would like to continue our sharing of stories over a cup of tea and home-made scone!

Our parish kitchen can have 3 people in it at one time, so our Hospitality Ministry would require 2 people for a weekday Mass and one for a Sunday mass. We will continue to offer lunch after the weekday Mass and a cuppa and biscuit after the Sunday Mass.

If you would like to pop your name down, please, please do so on the GREY board in the foyer of the church. The description of the role will also be on the board.

Of course our Cleaning Roster will look a bit different too and we will be buying the local shops out of wipes! The seats will be wiped down straight after each Mass so the **weekly** cleaning duties will be detailed on the GREY board in the foyer. If it sounds like something you may be interested in helping out with, again PLEASE pop your name down on the list. Once a month or even once every 6 weeks would be great.

If anyone is still a little confused—join the club. Ring or book a time to come into the office and we will try to make it simpler.

We are delighted to confirm that the leak in the slate roof of the church has been fixed and we have the cleaning of the damaged area of carpet, booked in. We are also getting a quote to have the foyer painted. Many great things are afoot. We are using our gifts but we promise not to loose the run of ourselves.

**Second Reading 1 Thes 5:1-6**

The day of the Lord is going to come like a thief in the night.  
You will not be expecting us to write anything to you, brothers, about ‘times and seasons’, since you know very well that the Day of the Lord is going to come like a thief in the night. It is when people are saying, ‘How quiet and peaceful it is’ that the worst suddenly happens, as suddenly as labour pains come on a pregnant woman; and there will be no way for anybody to evade it.  
But it is not as if you live in the dark, my brothers, for that Day to overtake you like a thief. No, you are all sons of light and sons of the day: we do not belong to the night or to darkness, so we should not go on sleeping, as everyone else does, but stay wide awake and sober.

Live in me and let me live in you, says the Lord;  
my branches bear much fruit.

**Gospel Mt 25:14-15. 19-21**

Because you have been faithful over a few things, enter into the joy of the Lord.

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: ‘The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out. Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. “Sir”, he said “you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made.” His master said to him, “Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master’s happiness.”’

**Gospel Reflection**

This week’s gospel is a very familiar parable and one that is often used with students and young people. It is generally used as an encouragement to make the most of the gifts and skills that the listeners possess. It is rarely, however, placed in its context as part of the full Chapter 25 lesson about the time of waiting and preparation for the coming of the Lord and the Christian life.

Again, the story is presented as a parable of the Kingdom – a glimpse into the right order of things in the realised Kingdom. A very wealthy master entrusts his considerable assets to his servants to manage in his absence. The three servants were allocated money, ‘each in proportion to his ability’. The emphasis of the parable is on what each servant did with the funds they were allotted. They were charged with managing the money in the place of their master; acting in their master’s place to further develop his wealth.

Like all of Jesus’ parables, this one has a sting in the tail. Although the third servant has done nothing illegal or corrupt, he is very harshly dealt with. His crime is laziness! He was given a great opportunity to demonstrate his abilities and yet he shied away and returned to his master exactly what had been entrusted to him, unimproved. The author of Matthew’s gospel uses this parable to shock the audience out of complacency. They cannot rely solely on the promised return of the Lord, they must continue to act on Jesus’ message and work to bring about the Kingdom in their own lives. Those who fail to act, leaving everything to the work of God, are as bad as the lazy servant who failed to grasp an extraordinary opportunity.
