100 at Mass - Sundays

Easy explanation

Everyone can come to Mass now, every Sunday. We can have 100 people at Mass, but we need to register everyone who attends by scanning a QR code with our smart phones. For those who have a smart phone and can do this, please scan yourself in and be prepared to help others who don't have a fancy phone. If you haven't got a smart phone, no problem, we'll do it for you.

Technical explanation

If we register everyone with pen and paper we can have 4sq metres per person = 50 people. If we QR code everyone we can have 2sq metres per person = 100 people. Why the difference? If we QR code, the contact tracers have instant access to data rather than contacting the parish to find and scan the handwritten notes, thus wasting precious hours. There is a different QR code for each church and this will be at the doors, in the pews, on the bulletins, easily available. You might need to download a code reader app. Sometimes it works straight from your camera.

We can handwrite the names and numbers for weekday Masses (smaller numbers) and also at Lake Bolac and Landsborough for Sundays. Lake Bolac and Landsborough will need to QR for Christmas and funerals because we'll be wanting to fit more people in at 2sqm.

Bookings Required for Christmas Masses in Ararat and Stawell

Christmas Masses in Stawell and Ararat – will be by **Advanced Bookings Only**

With 100 people allowed for Christmas Masses (Stawell 6pm Christmas Eve) (Ararat 7.30pm Christmas Eve) we just won't fit everybody who wants to come. So, here's what we're going to do. We're going to have Christmas Masses on Christmas Eve, and then again (the exact same Mass) on Sunday morning December 27.

In Stawell, Christmas Masses will be 6pm Christmas Eve and 10.30am on Sunday December 27.

In Ararat, Christmas Masses will be 7.30pm Christmas Eve and 8.30am on Sunday December 27.

These Masses will need to be booked in advance. Ararat's booking sheet is on the office door. Stawell's booking sheet is in the church, pinned to the wall.

3. He fills the starving with good things, sends the rich away empty. He protects Israel, his servant, remembering his mercy. (R.)

May you all be kept blameless, spirit, soul and body, for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Be happy at all times; pray constantly; and for all things give thanks to God, because this is what God expects you to do in Christ Jesus.

Never try to suppress the Spirit or treat the gift of prophecy with contempt; think before you do anything – hold on to what is good and avoid every form of evil.

May the God of peace make you perfect and holy; and may you all be kept safe and blameless, spirit, soul and body, for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. God has called you and he will not fail you.

Gospel Acclamation Is 61:1 (Lk 4:18)

Alleluia, alleluia!
The Spirit of the Lord is upon me;
he sent me to bring Good News to the poor.
Alleluia!

Gospel Jn 1:6-8. 19-28

There stands among you, unknown to you, the one who is coming after me.

A man came, sent by God. His name was John. He came as a witness, as a witness to speak for the light, so that everyone might believe through him. He was not the light, only a witness to speak for the light.

This is how John appeared as a witness. When the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, ‘Who are you?’ he not only declared, but he declared quite openly, ‘I am not the Christ.’ ‘Well then,’ they asked, ‘are you Elijah?’ ‘I am not,’ he said. ‘Are you the Prophet?’ He answered, ‘No.’ So they said to him, ‘Who are you? We must take back an answer to those who sent us. What have you to say about yourself?’ So John said, ‘I am, as Isaiah prophesied:

a voice that cries in the wilderness:
Make a straight way for the Lord.’

Now these men had been sent by the Pharisees, and they put this further question to him, ‘Why are you baptising if you are not the Christ, and not Elijah, and not the prophet?’ John replied, ‘I baptise with water; but there stands among you – unknown to you – the one who is coming after me; and I am not fit to undo his sandal-strap.’ This happened at Bethany, on the far side of the Jordan, where John was baptising.

Gospel Reflection

This week’s gospel should sound very familiar. It is the gospel of John version of the passage used in last week’s liturgy, which came from the gospel of Mark. Again it recalls the ministry of John the Baptist but it is given the particular slant of the gospel of John. Aside from the greater focus on the conversational interaction, it presents John as a ‘witness’. This is perhaps more typical of the John gospel emphasis on personal encounter with Jesus. Rather than acting as something of a herald, as in last week’s account, here John the Baptist is witnessing ‘to speak for the light’. He makes a very clear distinction between himself and the Christ, his mission is simply to point towards the light; the Christ.

Our common understanding of the word ‘witness’ tends to be related to legal situations: providing a witness statement or acting as a witness to a fact in court. The use of witness in this gospel carries a different connotation: to provide witness through action and lifestyle that draws others to wonder about and perhaps come to accept the motivating belief. It is this understanding of witness that all Christians are called to provide. We are called to witness to our beliefs in the way that we live our lives, engage with others and hold to certain truths. Of course, there are some Christians who believe that their witness needs to be more obvious and more clearly stated. They feel that providing witness, or testimony, to their faith through spoken proclamation has a greater potential to change lives. Whether we choose to witness through our words or through our actions it is essential that both words and actions have integrity; that there is no clash between what we proclaim and the way we live.
