GOSPEL: A READING FROM THE HOLY GOSPEL ACCORDING TO MARK - 10:46-52

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road. **The Gospel of the Lord. Pause All: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.**

Paolo gives Pope a hand in teaching Christian freedom

Pope Francis had a special guest help him illustrate the meaning of Christian freedom when a young boy wandered onto the stage during his general audience yesterday and made himself at home.

The Pope was continuing his series of talks on St

Paul's Letter to the Galatians and planned to reflect on the freedom that comes from serving and loving others.

As the Bible passage was being read, 10-year-old Paolo walked onto the stage and right up to Pope Francis, who shook his hand.

A papal aide offered Paolo a seat next to the Pope, which elicited applause from the crowd, and from the little boy. But he did not stay seated long; after clasping the Pope's hands again, Paolo pointed with amazement at the pope's zucchetto. Moments later, the young boy could be seen happily bounding down the steps, returning to his mother wearing a brand new zucchetto on his head.

Departing from his prepared remarks, Pope Francis said the boy's courage reminded him of "what Christ says about the spontaneity and the freedom of children."

"Jesus tells us, 'If you do not become like children, you will not enter the kingdom of God.' It is the courage to be close to the Lord, to be open to the Lord, to not be afraid of the Lord. I thank this child for giving this lesson to all of us," the Pope said.

"There is no freedom without love," Pope Francis said. "The selfish freedom of doing what I want is not freedom because it comes back to yourself, it isn't fruitful." Source: CNS.

LOCAL CONSULTATION OPENS FOR GLOBAL SYNOD OF BISHOPS

Catholics are invited to join local consultations about their experience of synodality within the Church as part of a two-year journey towards the next international Synod of Bishops, set for October 2023. Dioceses across the world hosted local Synod celebrations on Sunday, a week after Pope Francis officially opened the global process for the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops. The Synod theme is "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation and Mission". The local launches also marked the commencement of a period of diocesan consultations to help the Synod's preparation. Ten areas of synodality are being explored with questions in each area across those themes of communion, participation and mission. Catholics are invited to pray with, reflect upon and respond and to help develop a process of communal spiritual discernment.

Trudy Dantis, the director of the National Centre for Pastoral Research and national coordinator for the Synod of Bishops process, said the Synod is seeking to understand how people see the Church as a place where they can "journey together" as fellow pilgrims.

"As the key documents for the Synod outline, the Church's mission requires all the People of God to walk together, with each member playing their particular role in communion with their sisters and brothers," she said.

"This Synod is trying to move beyond intermittent moments of synodality towards 'walking together' as a norm within the Church."

Dr Dantis said the Church in Australia has, in many ways, been living that out in recent years.

"One thing we learned during the dialogue and discernment phases of the Plenary Council was the power of a guided process of prayer, reflection, listening and speaking that invites God into the conversation," she said.

"We will draw upon those lessons and encourage people to approach this Synod of Bishops journey with a spirit of openness to the Holy Spirit and the power of prayer."
