Happy New Year everyone! Today we start the new liturgical calendar and are in Year C, which has some of the most creative and stimulating combinations of Lectionary readings.

We concluded the liturgical calendar by meditating on the Second Coming of Our Lord, the end of history, and the Final Judgment. We now enter the first week of advent which is also given over to contemplating the return of Christ and the Final Judgment. This Sunday's readings continue to present to us Jesus as the King, the Son of David and Son of God, who will come to bring human history to its conclusion.

Jesus warns that tribulations will precede the coming of the Son of Man “in a cloud with power and great glory.” First World Christians perhaps, don't take seriously the reality that the Christian life is a struggle that requires exertion and sacrifice. In some parts of the First World, Christianity has been part of a comfortable cultural phenomenon, and the attitude has been one that pretty much everyone goes to heaven as long as you don't do anything “really bad,” like mass murder or something.

Jesus doesn't describe the path to salvation in terms like this at all. He constantly says it is difficult and implies or states that many will try and fail to enter “the kingdom of heaven” (see Luke 13:24 and Matt 7:14, for example). We can choose to believe either Jesus or the contemporary prophets of optimism concerning the nature of the path to heaven. I would recommend taking Jesus's words with utmost seriousness since he probably has more personal experience of the realities under discussion than modern theologians and intellectuals.

Jesus's words to us are “be vigilant at all times.” That is a lifestyle of attentiveness that lives each day as if it could be our last, knowing that Jesus may come for all of us—or just for one of us personally—at an hour we do not expect. Vigilance means a lifestyle of prayer, temperance in physical pleasures, fortitude (courage in the face of persecution), and love (self-sacrificial giving). These are the “ways of the Lord” in which he instructs us and so He gives us his Spirit and grace to enable us to live in this fashion.

MASSES: At this point, the Sunday Masses in Ouyen will be at full capacity which means that everyone can attend. Should our numbers exceed 50, those attending must be fully vaccinated and this must be visually recorded – either on your phone or else by sighting the papers themselves. Because our numbers are generally in the low 40's there is no need to record vaccination details at the present. Mass of a **Friday afternoon is at 4:00pm** and is also not recorded, it is open to all people but is limited to 50.

Wiping Down of Pews After Every Mass: In an effort to reduce spread of infection and any risk of contamination, 2 packets of sanitizing wipes will be left on both seats of the central front pews. **If the people nearest to them passes them out**, to their respective sides, each person can then wipe down their own seat and place their wipe in the bin on the way out.

National Day of Prayer for Myanmar Sunday 28th November: A level of freedom that had previously been enjoyed by the people ended on the 1st of February this year when military government was imposed. This weekend, the first Sunday of Advent, as we await the coming of our Lord, we pray with the people of Myanmar who yearn to be free. We especially remember the minority communities: the Karen, Rohingyas and Chin and for the Church communities of Myanmar who are very much under pressure.
