WE ARE A CHILD SAFE PARISH .

Dear Friends, In today's gospel we see someone ask a question of Jesus: Lord, will only a few people be saved? Which Jesus considers an irrelevant question. To answer such a question is to satisfy curiosity but is not helpful to anyone. Instead, Jesus answers, strive to enter through the narrow gate. What really matters is for us to be saved and for us to help save others. And that means entering through the narrow gate, what the Lord refers to elsewhere as denying ourselves, carrying our cross daily and following him. In practice, this means living selflessly in love of God and our fellow human beings. This is to do what Christ says, and what God wills.

Jesus points out to his followers that it is not enough for them to say we ate, drank in your company and you taught in our street. Even they will be rejected if they turn out to be evildoers. Jesus also predicts the coming into the kingdom of God of non-Jews, while the Jews who did wrong will be excluded. Today we can say that attaining salvation is not a matter of doing good and not doing evil. Many non-Christians will be saved if they follow their consciences and do good, while many Christians will be rejected if they do not do good. Our Christian religion is a greater help to know what Christ says, and what God wills, but our belonging to the Christians religion is not a guarantee that we will be saved. So, our Christian vocation is to love God and our brothers and sisters just as Jesus did. So let us ask the Lord to give us the heart and mind of Jesus so that we may be able to fulfil our Christian vocation in imitating in our witnessing life. -Neville.

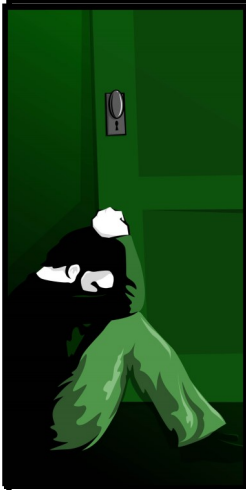

First Reading: *Is 66:18-21*

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

They will gather all of your people from all nations.

The Lord says this: I am coming to gather the nations of every language. They shall come to witness my glory. I will give them a sign and send some of their survivors to the nations: to Tarshish, Put, Lud, Moshech, Rosh, Tubal, and Javan, to the distant islands that have never heard of me or seen my glory. They will proclaim my glory to the nations. As an offering to the Lord they will bring all your brothers, on horses, in chariots, in litters, on mules, on dromedaries, from all the nations to my holy mountain in Jerusalem, says the Lord, like Israelites bringing oblations in clean vessels to the Temple of the Lord. And of some of them I will make priests and Levites, says the Lord.

The Lord disciplines those he loves.

Have you forgotten that encouraging text in which you are addressed as sons? My son, when the Lord corrects you, do not treat it lightly; but do not get discouraged when he reprimands you. For the Lord trains the ones that he loves and he punishes all those that he acknowledges as his sons. Suffering is part of your training; God is treating you as his sons. Has there ever been any son whose father did not train him? Of course, any punishment is most painful at the time, and far from pleasant; but later, in those on whom it has been used, it bears fruit in peace and goodness. So hold up your limp arms and steady your trembling knees and smooth out the path you tread; then the injured limb will not be wrenched, it will grow strong again.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

From East and West they will come to take their place in the kingdom of God.

Through towns and villages Jesus went teaching, making his way to Jerusalem. Someone said to him, 'Sir, will there be only a few saved?' He said to them, 'Try your best to enter by the narrow door, because, I tell you, many will try to enter and will not succeed.

'Once the master of the house has got up and locked the door, you may find yourself knocking on the door, saying, "Lord, open to us" but he will answer, "I do not know where you come from." Then you will find yourself saying, "We once ate and drank in your company; you taught in our streets" but he will reply, "I do not know where you come from. Away from me, all you wicked men!"

'Then there will be weeping and grinding of teeth, when you see Abraham and Isaac and Jacob and all the prophets in the kingdom of God, and yourselves turned outside. And men from east and west, from north and south, will come to take their places at the feast in the kingdom of God.
